When American Peter Trent's plane is shot down, he parachutes into a field near Anja's grandfather's farm, and she sees Peter as just one more in a long line of soldiers that she will help escape to return to his base in England. The journey will take months and he will need to travel across most of western Europe- all the while with the Gestapo in pursuit. There's just one small problem: Anja is falling in love with Peter. And loving this soldier could be life-threatening, not only for Peter but for Anja and her ten-year-old son as well."

Series: Book #2 in the “Peacemakers”. (I have not read book 1, “All God’s Children”.)

Spiritual Content- Deuteronomy 4:9 in the first part & Isaiah 43:10 at the second; Anja is a Quaker and has a very strong Faith; Mikel thinks she's crazy for believing in God in the world they live in; Peter grew up in Church but never really went deeper but admires Anja for her Faith and starts praying.

Negative Content- Guns are shot (no one is killed because of them); people are slapped by Nazi soldiers.

Sexual Content- Anja walks into a brothel (for shelter), thinking that the women were “doing what they thought was necessary to survive”, and says (in her mind) that her heart breaks at what those women have to do; *Spoiler* Once Peter & Anja are married and though Anja’s tired, she still wants to “consummate” the marriage (according to Peter the next day they did nothing); Peter studies her shoulder. *Spoiler*

This book is book 2 in the "Peacemaker's" series by Anna Schmidt. While it may be the 2nd in the series, this book can be read as a stand-alone.

Peter Trent is on his first mission and like most guys flying into enemy territory, he is scared of what the outcome may be. When the plane is shot down, he finds himself hurt and being rescued by a young boy who helped him hide in the ditch away from the Nazis. When she finds out that Daniel has helped hide the soldier, she is both angry and impressed. As the process begins to reunite Peter with his country, so begins the journey of these two strangers. Simple Faith, book 2 in Anna Schmidt's The Peacemakers series, presents an interesting look at the work of people of faith in the midst of the horror of WWII. Set in Belgium, France and Spain, the novel continues the story of Anja that began in book 1, All God's Children. It can, however, be read as a standalone. Filled with daring adventure, suspense and romance, Simple Faith is a recommended read for those who like historical romance set during WWII.

Peter Trent is an American airman forced to parachute from the disabled bomber he serves on. Behind enemy lines, Peter struggles to survive his initial landing. Found by the young son of Anja Jensen, Peter is rescued and set into the escape line run by Anja. But the Gestapo is on his trail and determined to find not only Peter, but to bring in those responsible for the running of the escape line. Fighting their growing attraction, Peter and Anja flee Belgium and start on their trek to Spain and freedom. But of course, there are lots of dangers awaiting them and others who fight for freedom.

Simple Faith is foremost a plot-driven romance with elements of suspense and danger for the characters. The romance is somewhat predictable, but the story of the escape lines providing its foundation is fascinating. Like the Underground Railroad used to transport slaves to freedom in the United States, escape lines operated in Europe allowing American, Canadian and British airman to return to England. The sacrifice that the local people made to protect the Allied forces is a story that needed to be told. These people risked everything, including torture and death, to make sure that strangers would live. Another interesting feature of the novel is Anja's Quaker faith. A pacifist, she looks for the Light in all she meets, including those who are her enemies. She is called to do her part to stop the Nazis. The Society of Friends or Quakers rely on silence to find the will of God and I found this a powerful image of God's voice to His people. I was surprised, though, that while there were many references to God and the Light, there was never any direct mention of Jesus. There also seemed to be a universalist bent to the faith portrayed by the characters.

If you like a book filled with historical detail, an interesting story, romance and likable characters then Simple Faith is a good book for you.

Anna Schmidt has outdone herself with Simple Faith, the second novel in her series, 'The Peacekeepers'! It can be read as a stand-alone book without having read the first book, All God's Children. Until now I was most familiar with her excellent 'Celery Fields' series. In Simple Faith she demonstrates an incredible eye for research and rich detail in this outstanding story of what ordinary people of faith did as they followed the leading of their Lord through the destruction and terror of Hitler's rule in 1940's Europe. This reader was completely drawn into the setting depicted by Anna Schmidt; I felt as if I were part of the action! And I now greatly admire the faith of the Quakers who inspired the characters of Anja, her grandparents and friends and their activities.

Simple Faith opens to the explosion and crash of an American plane shot down by Nazis near the farm belonging to Anja's grandparents, where she and her young son Daniel called home. Nazis quickly

surrounded the burning wreckage to capture any airmen who might still be alive. Peter Trent, one of the injured American airmen who parachuted from the plane as it went down, dragged himself as far away as he could, to a ditch on the farm. Anja assisted with Peter's medical care as Peter's escape from enemy territory was planned. There was something different, however, about Peter that Anja had not noticed with the rest of the troops she had helped, an attraction that couldn't be explained. An attraction that she had no time to consider during this time of her life. And even though it wasn't part of her plan, she had to help this man on the treacherous trail to freedom that took her further from the farm, and her family as the Gestapo's men pursued them across Europe.

A veteran escapee of a death camp, Anja attempted to live an obscure life befitting her Quaker faith as a nurse during the week. By weekend and often by night, she was a secret operative of those who helped airmen of the Allied troops escape from enemy territory to return to their country's service. These elaborately designed avenues of escape were not unlike the Underground Railroad that helped African American slaves in 1800's America, and those who helped the Allied troops escape faced if apprehended, torture and death at the hand of the Nazi's.

This reader found the book nearly impossible to put down! It is hard to imagine the lifestyle of one dedicated to helping people to freedom from the Nazi regime, especially of one who had already been in a death camp. The physical stamina alone would be daunting – and the spiritual strength tremendous! It would require a uniquely gifted, determined, and impassioned person who could think quickly on their feet, plan and make changes to those plans without notice. It also required a kind of acceptance that postponed one's own emotions until such a time – if any – that it was safe to let those emotions out, and a persevering faith in God. I tried to imagine throughout the book - could I have done so, in that position? It is with deepest admiration and respect that I consider those men and women who actually did help many men and women to freedom through war-torn Europe! It is with great admiration for Anna Schmidt, also, that I highly recommend this incredible book.

Life is very dangerous for Anja during the War. She is deeply involved in smuggling Allied air force men who have been shot down by German gunners back to safety. Now the Gestapo are aware of her actions and she is one of those that are on the run. She and Peter, a downed American pilot, have to flee with her son, Daniel and her friends, Josef and Lisbeth who have also been involved in the Resistance movement. It is very risky as they travel from Belgium to Paris and into Spain and finally to Britain. This is an engrossing story that's apparently based on historical facts.

Anna Schmidt's newest series is dedicated to telling little-known stories of heroism from WWII. I loved the first book, All God's Children, and I so enjoyed the second, Simple Faith. Both of them are exactly what they should be.

This one tells a story set around the Escape Lines, organized bands of men and women who ferried Allied Airmen to safety.

Pause for a moment and think about that: If you went down behind enemy lines, you were all alone. You'd be terrified and with good reason.

Imagine the feeling of awe that would come if you were discovered by a civilian who had the connections and the desire to help you? Imagine your reaction when they explain that you are now an "evader" and will become a passenger in the "escape line."

Now imagine that those escape lines criss-cross this occupied territory, that they are manned by everyone from professional actresses to creative farmers, that all who take part are in grave danger. Think about how the journey would be long and hard. You might have to walk or ride a bicycle and you might travel inside a coffin in a train car. Anything to keep you safe. You would be disguised and given lessons on what to do and who to be... but at the end lay British territory and a chance to get home eventually.

For Peter Trent, it all begins when his plane goes down. With the ruins still smoking behind him and the fate of his fellow crew unsure, Peter drags himself as far as he can and is not too hopeful about rescue when a young boy finds him.

That boy is Anja's son, and you may remember her and Daniel from All God's Children. Along with Daniel and her Grandparents, Anja has chosen to put her life on the line for complete strangers.

Thus it begins... a necessary bond formed between a widowed Quaker and an All-American airman.

Along the way we meet Doctor Josef, son of a Nazi Official who embodies German integrity and wants his beloved country back.

We meet Giselle, beautiful and exotic actress who puts her talents to use creating ruses that save lives.

And we meet Mikel, a Basque who has known his share of grief. He's almost convinced himself not to hope ever again... but Daniel and Anja keep changing his mind. Mikel keeps a sense of dark humor, and it is he who reminds us that American's are the most difficult people to rescue because they think they know everything.

These are men and women who deal with loss, who cling to those they love, who hold fast to hope, and who ache for those who are suffering. You can't help but be moved by this vividly told tale of WWII heroism.

In the continuing story of Anja, Beth and others first introduced in All God's Children, the audience will be captivated by the way locals help downed airmen to safety. The network of characters brought to life on the pages will remind people of other acts of bravery done to help during times of war. The Gestapo is always on the heels of the main characters, attempting to keep them from leaving Germany. Not only is the Gestapo presence more visual to locals, the risk of dangers grows exponentially with each attempt to return men to their homeland while keeping the locals from being caught. Even with the main characters from the first story having to obtain new identities there are no guarantees that they will ever be safe. Plus some dark sinister man has infiltrated the escape route used and as the safe houses begin to be torn apart by the Nazis, time becomes even more crucial to moving people before they are caught.

In book 2, the tension builds as readers might find themselves wondering who the antagonist is and who is not. Lives are at stake as well as the future welfare of Germany once the war is over, with most people knowing that their lives and country has been forever changed. Again, the author reveals a couple tenets of the Quaker faith as the tale climaxes and will be completed in book three to be released this summer.

While some author's books can be read as stand alone, the Peacemakers series isn't one of them so please read All God's Children first so you can follow the developing tale. The tension, love, faith, romance and description of scenes capture the imagination from the first to the last page. Personally, I cannot wait to see how the author wraps up the series. I have enjoyed the books very much!

Anja is a widowed mother of a ten year old boy, Daniel. She has suffered horribly through the war and her back story is told in All God's Children. However, Simple Faith can be read as a stand alone book and the reader will learn all that has happened in Anja's life. The trials she has suffered, along with her Quaker faith, fuel Anja's desire to help Allied airmen escape across Europe and past the enemy lines.

As much as I enjoyed the first book in this series and looked forward to reading Simple Faith, I was unprepared for how much I was going to love this book! It starts off with a bang right from the beginning as we watch Peter Trent make his escape by parachuting into enemy territory. He finds himself injured and trapped in Belgium. He must learn to trust in the ability of Anja, Mikel, Josef and Lisbeth to help him heal and escape. This is no simple feat and danger follows them throughout the whole novel. Peter has to hide and recuperate, all the while the Gestapo is searching for him. If you have followed my book reviews for any length of time, then you know I am a huge WWII fan of both historical fiction and non fiction books. I am so thrilled I got the opportunity to review Anna Schmidt's novel, Simple Faith, the second novel in the Peacemakers Series. In this one she utilizes the true story of a group of German medical students who banded together in what came to be known as the White Rose to speak out against Hitler and the Nazis.

The journey of the characters of Anja and Josef and Beth take in this novel is set against the background of historical fact. "Amazingly, during World War II there were several so-called escape lines managed by brave local citizens of countries occupied by the Nazis. Like those who worked on the Underground Railroad, these individuals - at considerable risk to their own lives and safety - provided false papers, safe houses, food, shelter, and clothing to move Allied airmen from the site of their downed planes behind enemy lines across much of Europe until they could reach Gibraltar - a British territory - and move from there back to England. They traveled hundreds, even thousands of miles by train, bicycle, or on foot, and perhaps the most amazing piece of this story is that the best known of these escape lines - the Comet Line - was created and managed by a young woman." (excerpt).

This is the story of Second Lieutenant Peter Trent who was shot down while attempting to escape a fire in his bomber that was activated by a photoflash bomb and thus requiring an immediate evacuation of the plane. This was not before being shot in the leg and as he tries to remember all his survival training tips as he parachutes into Belgium in November of 1943, he only hopes he can make it out alive along with the five other crewmen who jumped with him. But for now with being shot in the leg, he can only hope that a "friendly" comes to rescue him before the Nazi Gestapos do.

What Peter does discover is a band of people who are willing to risk their lives and those of their children to make sure that he finds his way back home instead of being shot or captured by the Nazi's. Peter and Anja are about to embark on a life changing journey that will do more than test their survival skills but also test their faith in God along the way.
