The Marriage Agreement is the ninth book in Renee Ryan's, Charity House series. While I've read a couple of the books in the series, I actually haven't managed to read them in any order. That being said, you definitely don't have to start at the beginning to thoroughly enjoy this book. Though I'm sure it would have most likely helped me keep the characters straight while I was reading, I didn't feel lost or spend the entire story trying to catch up. I confess, I didn't have many expectations for this book, since I haven't read anything of Renee's recently. If I'd had any, I believe they would have been surpassed, as I immensely enjoyed this book.

I very much enjoy Renee's writing style and this book is no exception! Her descriptions are great and quickly pull me into the setting and the story. I love the historical details she includes and appreciate the

research that must go into her books. I do confess that there were a couple instances that I questioned Renee's choice of wording as it didn't seem to fit the time period. As I obviously didn't live in the chosen period, I can't say for absolute certain that it was not historically accurate, but regardless, the dialogue didn't seem to fit the character speaking. But, this is mostly me nitpicking. The wording didn't effect my enjoyment of the book or even give me much pause while reading.

This book definitely held my attention and didn't want to let go! I found myself picking it up during every spare moment and not wanting to put it down. It kept me up well past when I should have been asleep and I grabbed it again almost as soon as I woke up. It is fast paced and never lags. The story flows quickly from point to point and I found myself rushing through it, all the while reminding myself to slow down and savor it. Obviously, the latter didn't happen very often. Though, I must confess that I found the ending a bit abrupt. I do generally feel that way with most of the books I read, so this isn't actually saying very much. I would always like the ending to be longer, simply because I'm rarely ready to say "goodbye" to the characters. I really enjoyed the characters, as well. Fanny and Jonathon are both very realistic and I was able to easily relate to both of them. Fanny is sweet and kind, though somewhat impulsive. She is also strong, stubborn, and intelligent. I loved her heart for others, as she always tried to put them first. She loves deeply and forgives quickly, something I definitely need to learn. Jonathon is her opposite in many ways. He holds himself aloof from everyone, giving only the impression of openness. He has a good reason for this though - he doesn't want to hurt anyone, nor does he want to be hurt. I loved watching him grow and change, as he learned to love Fanny fully and open himself to others.

The romance was very sweet, if a bit predictable. But that's to be expected and I personally enjoy reading books where the "happily ever after" is a given, rather than a possibility. I adored watching both Fanny and Jonathon fall in love. They had several obstacles to overcome, something that made their happy ending even more rewarding. They must learn compromise and put their spouse's needs before their own. I appreciated that Renee took the time to explore their marriage a bit and specifically point out that every marriage takes hard work and determination to make it last.

The spiritual element is an important one, for the story as well as the reader. Much of the focus is on forgiveness. I loved this quote that I feel sums up the theme quite well, "Forgiveness was hard, and came at a price, but the cost of bitterness was far steeper." - Jonathon Hawkins* He had to learn how to forgive, but also how to accept forgiveness and God's grace. I appreciated the care Renee used with this topic. It certainly isn't an easy one, but she definitely does it justice, never rushing the story to make it fit within the constraints. There is a slow progression, allowing us to follow each step of his journey toward God's grace. I would highly recommend this book to anyone who enjoys historical romance and marriage of convenience stories!

THE MARRIAGE AGREEMENT, book 9 in the Charity House series, is an achingly beautiful Christian inspirational romance that stirred my heart! Although this is only the second book that I've had the pleasure of reading in the series, this book very much works as a standalone.

Fanny, the beautiful, dutiful daughter of the large, gregarious Mitchell clan, has worked hard to rise above the scandal that ensued when she broke off her engagement to Reese, who is now happily married to her sister Callie. Now a well-respected member of Denver society, she will always be eternally grateful to her boss, the dashing, enigmatic Jonathon Hawkins, who had come to her rescue after the engagement ended and offered her a job at his hotel. She quickly worked her way up the ranks and is now a highly lauded event planner. However, unbeknownst to Jonathon, she is totally smitten with him. And, of course, the feeling is mutual. What man wouldn't be enchanted with a woman like Fanny? She is breathtakingly beautiful, sweet, savvy and gentle-spirited. Any gentleman in his right mind would be fortunate to have her as his wife. But Jonathon cannot allow himself to act on his feelings. He bears the emotional scars of a painful past, and in his misspent youth, he was going down such a dark, dangerous path, if not for the time spent at the Charity House, where he was given a home and lavished with unconditional love, he never would have survived.

Now a handsome, wildly successful hotelier, his rags to riches story is legendary in Denver and he inspires everyone he meets. Fanny most of all. Although he doesn't lack for female admirers, to the consternation of many, including the well-to-do town matchmaker Mrs. Singletary, marriage and family are not in the cards for him. He is determined that the cycle of sin that ran rampant in his family ends with him. Therefore, his mantra is "business first, business always" and proudly carries on the tradition of being generous in deed and spirit, lessons instilled in him at the Charity House, and has grandiose plans to do even greater good for those less fortunate.

As the book opens, Fanny and Jonathon are busy preparing for a grand charity ball, the largest and most highly anticipated of the year, and it is her chance to prove to society once and for all that she will no longer be defined by the past. But on the night of the ball, when Fanny steals her overworked boss away for a brief respite outside, the lure of the moonlight and the stars prove impossible to resist, and they succumb to a forbidden kiss. But their moment of temptation is caught and misconstrued by the Ferguson sisters, notorious town gossips, and the fallout is dire. Vowing to do the right thing so her reputation won't be tainted forever, Jonathon chivalrously proposes a marriage of convenience. At first, a guilt-ridden Fanny balks at the proposal because she does not want to trap Jonathon into a loveless marriage, but he is determined to protect her at all costs and finally convinces her to do him the great honor of being his wife. But can he ever truly be the husband that she richly deserves?

I enjoyed every single moment of this book! Renee Ryan is a glorious storyteller and effortlessly sweeps you into this winsome romance. I truly felt every sweet, longing glance, reveled in every chaste kiss, experienced every moment of heartache, every bittersweet triumph. Jonathan is wonderfully complex, nuanced hero who is so deliciously brooding and tortured! I love everything about him—his hard edge, his checkered past, his gruffly tender, unassuming charm. And most especially, his big, noble heart. Although he fights his feelings for Fanny, it is evident from the onset that his heart belongs to her. But as the product of an alliance between a “woman of questionable virtue and an adulterer,” he is a man who has endured so much loss and suffering and feels unworthy of love. But now that scandal has broke and he realizes that marriage to Fanny is inevitable, it sparks a small flicker of hope that perhaps that with the right woman—namely Fanny—he could be a good and righteous husband. However, then the doubt would still creep in and he would hold a piece of himself back, afraid the ugliness of his past would somehow rub off on this beautiful, radiant woman who deserves a lifetime of happiness.

A gradual shift in his mindset occurs during the course of this story, and although it is a slow, painstaking process, he eventually does begin to see himself through Fanny’s adoring eyes, as a man who is good and noble, honest and true, and harbors hope that he may indeed eventually combat a lifetime of distorted thinking. As a reader whose heart was fully engaged in this hero’s emotional journey, it was indeed a rewarding thing to behold to watch his gradual awakening to love, to witness firsthand how this beautiful, effervescent woman brightens the dark corners of his world and helps him come to the epiphany: “Every mistake, every wrong turn, every good and wise decision, has led him to this one woman. Fanny Mitchell was his destiny, his future.”

As for Fanny, she is a wonderfully resilient heroine that I so admired. One of seven siblings raised in a happy, loving Christian home on a ranch outside of Denver, she’d always been the good, obedient daughter, afraid of making a misstep or letting anyone down. But when she broke off her engagement to Reese, it took a toll on her supportive family, and although she finally managed to move past the scandal and counts her sweet blessings, now that four of her siblings are married off, she secretly aches for true love of her own. And now, through a twist of fate, she finally has a shot at everlasting happiness with the man of her dreams. But she will not settle for his ridiculous stipulation of a childless marriage of convenience. More than anything, she desperately wants what her parents had—a blessed, Godly marriage filled with laughter, joy, companionship, children, and deep abiding love. I adored how Fanny always sees the good in Jonathon, never once faltering in her devotion, showing infinite kindness and patience as she fights tooth and nail to prove to him he is a treasured child of God and gives him the courage to take a leap of faith—with her—to hopefully help him break free from his tortured past.

One of my favorite things about Renee Ryan’s writing is her gorgeous, vibrant prose. She is a master wordsmith, painting such a vivid picture with her eloquent imagery, that I feels as if each and every word is etched in gold! Her physical descriptions, dialogue and body language are so authentic that the characters literally leap off the page, giving us the visual connection we need to fully envision them. Moreover, Jonathon and Fanny are full-bodied and very multi-faceted characters. I related to both the hero and heroine immediately and really felt the deep emotions churning beneath the surface. But writing mechanics aside, the one thing that I look for in a compelling read is whether the characters speak to me, whether their emotional journeys strikes a visceral chord in me, and it did that and more. This book made me laugh, cry...and, most important, FEEL!

The plot moves at a brisk pace, and the romantic tension is sustained throughout. I think Ms. Ryan does a commendable job of balancing out some of the darker, angstier scenes with moments of lightness and charm. The dramatic and romantic arcs were seamlessly incorporated into the story, as was the faith element, and the inclusion of secondary characters broadened the scope and added rich texture to the plot. As for the ending, I

thought the resolution was picture perfect and is guaranteed to resonate with readers. In fact, I was so overcome with emotion at the end, it brought tears of joy to my eyes.

I simply can't recommend THE MARRIAGE AGREEMENT highly enough for fans of this genre, and feel the sky's the limit for this mega-talented author!

The characters are all well developed and the minor characters are well represented as well.
