I've never read anything by Sharon Sala before so I had no expectation going into this book. I really loved the premise, a whore and a drunk trying to fool the townspeople into believing the drunk is now a visiting preacher. I could just imagine the hijinks involved with that one, unfortunately, what I imagined didn't occur until the last 2/3 of the book.

We begin with learning the background story of Letty Murphy, the whore and how she ended up in her situation. We also learn about Eulis, the drunk and why he's in his situation. Then we move on to other characters such as: two trappers, a banker and a widow, a miner and the object of his affection, the preacher, a halfbreed Indian, an Irish imigrant and two incompetent troublemakers, and a boy with no name. These stories all seem a little random but they all come together in the end. I just wish they were a little more relavent to the story then the way they were presented.

My only other objection to the book was that most of the characters aren't very likeable. They are completely self absorbed and mean. But once Eulis impersonates the preacher things pick up and conclude in a very satisfying way. I will be reading more of the adventures of Letty and Eulis in the Amen Trail.
