This is a goody two shoes/alien romance. I enjoyed the story but what was lacking was hot alien sex. I have not researched the categories of this novel but it seems like it's more for the young adult crowd and I feel like it would have been a better novel if there were actual sex scenes involved instead of "fade to black".

Quick Rundown: Younger Chick is the second sister in a family where her parents gave up everything they have in order to be initial colonizers of a planet that needs people to eventually make a new planet habitable without having to use oxygen masks as it's a process to make a planet that way. The family finds themselves in poorer situation than they were in the below ground existence they had on the moon. Yeah, they get to go outdoors now but not without an oxygen mask and find they have to keep their atmospheric generators (which over time will make the planet more hospitable) running in order to escape heavy fines. They are pioneers that had been sold a line of goods that were not accurate and their lifestyle has become that of pretty poor poverty. The oldest daughter (along with her good looks) has acquired a scholarship on another more hospitable planet leaving our Chick to help run the farm with her father and a mother who has pretty much withdrawn into herself. A mishap by the father puts this Chick into the hands of their neighbor who happens to be from a planet where they completely enrobe themselves so no one knows their secret about their race. She goes willingly knowing there's nothing else she can do to get them out of this situation only to find that this guy who lives in such luxury among such a harsh environment could turn out to be her savior.

Characterization/Plot: This was very well done. I understood the personalities of all the characters despite the fact that Dude is so secretive in the beginning. The Chick's family is also very well done and I got a complete feeling for this second daughter's position within her family and in regards to Dude. Anika's poverty-stricken family has moved to an inhospitable planet or moon that is being terraformed by its inhabitants. Anika is self-sacrificing for her family and goes to live with the mysterious neighbor hoping things will turn out "OK" and gets so much more. The Zhore wants marriage but will not reveal himself to her and hides behind dark robes. Nor will he explain why. Anika wants honesty and Sarzhin just thinks she wants to see if he's a monster or not.

If you like sci-fi with a little alien romance, I highly recommend this book and will be checking out others in the series.
