I read *Starling* over two years ago and while I was taken by the book it took me a long time to finally pick up the sequel, which I did when I saw the trilogy finale on Edelweiss. I was ready to dive back into the world Livingston had created but was afraid that it might not live up to everything I had remembered it to be and I'd be lying if I said I wasn't a little disappointed. When I picked up *Transcendent* though, I was ready, and **I was not the least bit disappointed. This book lived up to the expectations one might have from a finale and there wasn't a moment where I wasn't practically bouncing off the walls with excitement.**

I think the key to why this book made me so happy is that with finales there is always a good chance the author might decide to throw in some unnecessary romantic drama to make the stakes higher but Livingston didn't go down that road. **What made her book work was that with all this chaos unfolding, the main characters decided to stick together and see it through.** There were no secrets, no nothings, they planned together and they TALKED. **It's beautiful seeing communication done so well.**

Mason is a good female lead. I say good and not great because I am starting to realize that the two are not one and the same but Mason was a good female lead. **I cheered for her and she's just one of those female leads who isn't impulsive and actually likes to think things through.** It doesn't mean she doesn't make mistakes. Of course she does, she has her selfish moments too but all of them are realistic so you cannot help but relate to her dilemma. She didn't ask for any of this but now she's trying to handle it with the best of her ability.

Fenrys is good character as well. I think my favorite thing about him is that he is always willing to stick with Mason no matter what. He is a great shoulder to lean on and he is there for her when she needs him. He complements her perfectly which is why they make such a great couple. They are both brave and smart but neither of them are perfect and they work so well together!

You might have realized this by now but I'll mention it anyway, they are great as couple. They work well together. In fact, while they've had some bumps in their relationship, none of it was ever the result of unnecessary drama. This is the kind of relationship you want to read about. End of story.

The fact remains that this series doesn't have any mind blowing world building but the way the author adopts some of the mythological aspects and makes them her own are definitely worth mentioning. I particularly enjoyed her take on Loki! And I loved the way she mixed in other myths and gods too. So while the series focused particularly on Nordic mythology, there were some elements of other myths present which made not just this book, but the entire series, fun to read.

Considering that Ragnorak is just around the corner in this book, or actually, pretty much taking place, the stakes are high. It's clear from the way this book is written. **It's very fast paced and keeps you on your toes but the author makes sure that while things are serious, there are always little moments that relieve the tension and just make the reading experience all the more better.**

But getting back to the fact that this book is a finale, **I personally enjoyed the final showdown.** I thought it was well written. Everything has been building up to the moment and while I would have been happy had the

moment laster longer, by no means was it rushed. The author did the series justice with her finale and I loved the way things were wrapped up. It wasn't too neat but it wasn't depressing either. Which is just the way I like it.

While this isn't the most amazing or the most interesting series out there, I'd still suggest giving this one a shot just because of how fun it is. The pages fly by and the characters are all interesting to read about. I know I am definitely going to be missing them. In the finale of a thrilling series Mason with the help of Fennrys, Rafe the Egyptian god of death, and her friends will fight one last battle to undo the destiny planned for mankind.

Set in Manhattan, Lesley Livingston has created a story that binds Greek, Roman and Norse mythology with Egyptian and Celtic legends to produce an imaginative and heart-pounding series that sweeps you into a highly intense and suspenseful adventure to determine the survival of mankind. Even the ending of a tale that twists and turns as events progress overflows with surprises.

The characters come alive in the pages of this novel, and are unforgettable with all their flaws, faults, doubts and expectations. This third and final book in the Starling series is a multi-POV work of urban fantasy, heavy on the Norse mythology angle while incorporating a mashup of pantheons that include ancient Greek and Egyptian elements.

I will admit upfront that I haven't read the first two in the series, and as this book doesn't seem meant to stand alone particularly well, I recognize my lack of foreknowledge has likely impeded my enjoyment. Still, the story took off from a high point of action (which must have been a cliffhanger in the previous book) and didn't slow until about halfway through. This reader would liken the feel of Transcendent to a sort of matured YA version of the Percy Jackson series—demi-god teens (who may or may not be aware of their ancestry) all attending a special school for the preternaturally-inclined, gods running amuck causing external conflict, destiny vs. personal choices causing internal conflict, cryptic prophecies, an emphasis on teamwork and loyalty, etc. The story features a fairly large (though largely distinct) cast, and is told from numerous 3rd-person points of view—though the primary focus (outside of the Ragnarok end-of-the-world scenario) is on the romantic relationship between Mason and Fennrys.

A significant positive to this book is Livingston's appealing prose and solid handling of the many battle scenes. The pacing of this story carried me along engrossingly for the first half, dropping in enough breadcrumbs that I could piece together critical events from the previous books. I even found myself wanting to know several characters better so I'd know if I wanted them to succeed. Unfortunately, with so much going on and a set of flat villains whose motives I didn't really understand, the second half of the story ended up feeling needlessly drawn out.

Mason makes for a sturdy, determined heroine—though in this book it was never very clear why she and Fennrys developed such a passion for each other over the course of what this reader understands to be the few days (or possibly weeks) time this series is taking place within. Mason's claustrophobia issue is brought up now and again, but an explanation of its cause was only alluded to. (My assumption is that the past trauma with her brother somehow killing her when she was a child is given vividness in one of the previous

books.)

Heather, the only mundane human featured in this storyline, turned out to be one of the most likeable and interesting characters. The ex-boyfriend she still loves is ridiculously, senselessly in love with Mason—who is already clearly involved with someone else. But while she's in pain, Heather is not bitter enough to hate Mason for what she can't control, nor petty enough to twist fate in her favor. Her bravery in the face of her own frailty carried more emotional weight and meaning than most (if not all) of the other nearly indestructible players on this chessboard o' fate.

I would recommend this book for those with a penchant for Norse mythology and a preference for series that feel like one long, continuous work that's been broken into more manageable pieces.

What I loved the most about this series was Mason and Fenn. In the beginning they are two possible enemies/love interests who circle each other. They are both a little wary while they try to figure out if they can trust each other and what exactly is going on. They both need a safe haven, but they don't know if they can be that for each other. Then when they find strength in each other, it is a test to stay together. I really loved how their friendship grew and their relationship was strengthened through each book. So please be aware that if you have not read *Starling* or *Descendant* this will contain spoilers. So please STOP now and read the first two books before reading *Transcendent*. Literally, *Transcendent* starts where *Descendant* ends. Mason has become a Valkyrie and Cal stabbed Fennrys, so in moments Mason is begging Rafe to save Fennrys. In doing so she has fulfilled another part of the prophecy by making Fennrys the Wolf!

Fennrys finds his mother and finds out that he is Loki's son, and he was sent away so that he wouldn't fulfill his part in the prophecy, but considering the love between Mason and Fennrys, things are different than they should be. In the shocking conclusion of *Descendant* we find out Roth killed Mason while under some form of control by a god. Mason's mother had become Hel, so she sent her back but all of this is part of what enables her to become a Valkyrie. Mason is working overtime to not start Ragnarok. I can't say too much more along these lines because of spoilers!

Transcendent is a pretty satisfying ending to the trilogy! All-in-all, these were good books. I think the romance could have been done a touch more, but I did love Mason and Fennrys. I did find it a little funny that in each book these kids are finding out they aren't quite human. The stretching out of all the half gods unveiling was a little silly, but I will say it all made sense within the storyline. It played into a larger part of the story, which I found interesting!

Wow! That was quite a ride! A long time ago, after completing the Wondrous Strange trilogy, I SO wished for more of this world from Lesley...particularly more of Fennrys. And she sure did deliver. While the *Starling* books do take place in the same world, with some favourites from the original trilogy making an

appearance along with Fennrys, this was still predominantly Mason Starling's story with Fenn as a rather large (and HOT) co-star. In my reviews for books one and two, I stated that you did not necessarily need to read the Wondrous Strange books but you DO get so much more out of this story if you do...but at the very least...I would suspect that many would like to read them if they haven't already following Mason & Fennrys's journey.

Picking up where Descendant left off, the pace of the story didn't really let up...at all. Revelations were a plenty and the many questions I had all along were answered.

Tricked into taking up Odin's spear, Mason has taken up the mantle and huge responsibility of Valkyrie...the ultimate chooser of the slain of Norse legends, and catalyst for the impending Ragnarok...the Norse term for the apocalyptic ending of the world. Her love, Fennrys, lay dying at her feet, and having just learned of her family's betrayal, she certainly had a lot to overcome. But Mason was strong willed and smart. But was it enough to defeat the impending Ragnarok and save the world...with limited casualties? I always felt she had the tools and support to do it...but I have to admit it looked pretty bleak.

Fennrys had his own obstacles as well. I knew from his previous tenure in the Wondrous Strange books, there was much more to him than the impulsive yet self-serving Janus guard. I KNEW there was much more behind that mask...and we got to see it full-on (in more ways than one), in this new chance at life (even if the reasons behind his second chance were perhaps nefariously orchestrated). I think he softened as his love was reciprocated this time around, and having learned the truths of his history and why's and how's of where he ended up. Not to mention, he had my heart melting with every searing look and awkward smile he gave Mason.

Mason and Fennrys had a lot going against them...prophecies, fate, magick...it really felt like the cards were stacked against them. But I loved, loved, loved how both worked together in this last book. They are just awesome together.

Lesley took on the enormous task of mixing several mythologies into this trilogy...Norse, Roman, Greek, Egyptian...did I leave out any? Oh, yeah...celtic!
