I've made several things from this book, so far with 100% success. Almost no pattern errata, which is especially important. Built-in seam allowances, full size patterns, and all incredibly adorable and creative ideas. Many items are two dimensional, but there are some more complex three dimensional toys as well (gussets). This one will be on my shelf permanently. Great appendix/resource guide in the back with illustrated instructions.

Super simple - which I like. The patterns are very manageable.

I want a bit more seam allowance. Right now the patterns demand very precise sewing. I'm going to play with size to see if it helps make a more manageable project.

Update: I definitely, definitely recommend playing with sizing.

The whimsical sweetness of Hillary's designs is appealing to crafters of all levels, and the book is written in a cheerful, encouraging tone that makes no project seem too difficult to tackle. The bright colors and interesting fabric choices are lovely to peruse, and the author ably demonstrates her techniques for creating distinctive hair styles using different materials, including ribbon, stitched yarn, cut yarn, etc. This trend toward full color, hardback craft books with cloth spines is a pleasing one, since it eliminates the waste and shabby corners of a dust jacket while maintaining the good quality of a hardcover.

The projects in Wee Wonderfals include soft animals, dolls wearing real clothes, embroidered and decorated pillows, bags shaped like animals, and more, all of which are appropriate for gift-giving. My favorite projects are probably Hillary's versions of a topsy turvy doll (pictured in yellow on the book cover), as well as bookish Evelyn Inchworm and her flowered head scarf.

Each charming toy is accompanied by a short anecdote with the source of Hillary's inspiration for the piece. The stories are just long enough to give a little peek into her creative world without being distracting, and they enhance the reader's appreciation for the featured doll or animal. The usual basic glossary and sewing techniques are covered here, along with a satisfying list of online resources. The book also includes all the patterns necessary for each toy, which may be photocopied and enlarged as needed.

This book is a must-have for any fan of Hillary's work, as well as for any crafter who loves quality handmade toys. The toys are adorable, the projects are fun, and the book will be one you'll reach for again and again for inspiration.

Some very cute things to create in this book. A few would be simple enough to do easily, most would be somewhat complicated or time consuming. However the instructions read well and are not hard to follow, and the patterns would be easy to scan onto a computer and print out. The word adorable has been used a good bit in reference to this book, and I can see why. My favorite thing to be made is the Ellie bag, an elephant shaped stuffed animal bag.

There are several I may consider, but I can't wait to make Hansel and Gretel out of wooden spoons as seen on page 113.

I love the aesthetic of these toy designs - classic and timeless, but without being dated. I've made the Bjorn Bear several times, and the boy and girl dolls are just delightful. Her instructions are easy to follow, and the illustrations help clarify any confusion.

The patterns are in the back of the book; you trace them onto paper (and you can magnify them if you want your toy to be larger). I'd recommend transferring the original tracing onto cardboard; the patterns will last longer, especially if you're likely to re-use a favorite pattern.

Some of these dolls are cute, some not so much, but there are a lot of interactive extras that are nice such as a pillow with a two dimensional doll on the front and a pocket in back with clothes to attach, much like a paper doll. There's the doll I remember in my childhood that are two dolls in one attached upside down where the skirt covers the one not being used. I liked the version I saw better which was little red riding hood with the wolf/grandmother on the other side.

The instructions are good with small steps and good illustrations. There is information on how to stitch on yarn hair. The biggest problem is that other than the few creative interactive projects and the stuff animals, the dolls look very similar. So there were some clever projects, and all were well executed, most just weren't my style.

I wish good instructions went with projects I like. I repeatedly see one or the other but rarely both and this is no exception. Sigh.

So far I've only made one doll (Patchwork Penny), but it came out great. And, coming from someone who had prior to this sewn a total of two square pillowcases, that should tell you a lot about the detail and understandability of Lang's text and diagrams. Overall though, it's a great book. The patterns/instructions work, for one. There's a real variety, for two; lots of different styles of hair/dress/body type for infants to older kids. And it's just pretty. The selection of vintage fabrics used throughout really speaks to my own visual aesthetic, the photography is crisp and a useful comparison to your own project, as well as just being attractive. I initially borrowed this title from the library to make sure I would be able to use it. After completing my first project, I immediately ordered a copy for myself. Planning on referencing this a lot.

Lots of patterns, and good value because of that. Also, it gets a full extra star for full sized patterns, omg.

To review doll making books, I generally try to make at least one of the dolls. I started off with Katy, which made a well shaped Richard Scarry inspired cat head, and then at some point lost interest and started using her as a pin cushion. Sorry, Katy. But it was a nice head.

I had less luck with Margot, the topsy-turvy doll my son wanted. The body itself was nice, but I got thoroughly tangled up in the clothes instructions, and they still seem to be like a counterintuitive way to do it. The sizes seemed all wrong--maybe I measured them wrong. Damn imperial measurements. The yarn-embroidered hair looked nice, but it just wasn't happening.

Still, the results are cute, and fascinate my son.

Lang is an original. I'm completely enamored of her ability to create, from her imagination, lovely playthings that children actually WANT to play with!
