On the outside, Lily Isley's life seems perfect: a wealthy husband, a ritzy gated community in Dallas, and a handsome son, AJ—a decorated marine about to be married to his love, Shea. But when a bridesmaid is murdered in AJ's apartment and he can't be found, Lily's world collapses and a long-held family secret is at risk of exposure.

Dru Gallagher's life took a different course. After her ex-husband, suffering from post-traumatic stress, threatened her and her daughter, Shea, with a shotgun, Dru was forced to leave her marriage and forge ahead as a working-class single mom. Now, the anger she sees in war veteran AJ's eyes is heartbreakingly familiar—and makes Dru deeply afraid for her daughter's safety...especially after Shea's best friend and maid of honor is found dead.

With a killer on the loose and time running out, Lily and Dru, two very different women, unite in a single goal: to save their precious children from scandal, even from death. But will the mothers' protection be enough, or will the fateful secret they expose—and the truth it reveals—destroy every hope of love?

I had high hopes for this book, I love a good domestic suspense and the premise for this captured my attention easily. I'm so torn about how I actually feel about The Truth We Bury, there were parts I liked and parts I didn't at all, so I'll just explain my stance and let you decide what you think.

There was something compulsive about this book, I read it really fast and it mostly held my attention. The authors writing style was solid and she clearly has a talent. This would be a great read for a book club as there are several themes and issues one could dissect and discuss. One that I really appreciated was the subject of PTSD. It explored how it effects not only those suffering from it, but also how it impacts their families and loved ones. The families whose lives intersect had plenty of secrets and what's a domestic suspense without loads of secrets?!

While all of what I mentioned previously was great, there was something lacking overall that made this an enjoyable read for me. This is told using dual narratives, that of two mothers whose children are engaged. I always like this style, I just felt there needed to be more distinction between their sections here. The characters also fell a bit flat for me, they needed to be more fleshed out and I didn't really care about them all that much which is always a sign that something is missing for me. The pacing was also on the slow side and I would've liked things to be more suspenseful than they were. The premise was solid, there just needed to be more meat, you know what I mean?

Overall, this wasn't a bad read, it just wasn't one of my favorites. It was light, an emotional mystery that I felt was lacking depth. I found it to be pretty predictable and was left wanting more in the end.

Since the last few books I've read recently have been jumping around in genre, I was very glad to get back into one of my favorites: murder mysteries. And make no mistake: even though this book does start out a bit slowly and does include a lot of dialogue between characters, this is a gripping murder mystery. By way of summary, this book uses a third-person narration that nonetheless follows two different characters at different times: one of them is Lily, the mother of a presumed murderer, and the other is Dru, the mother of said presumed murderer's fiancée (oh, and, to make this even more interesting, the person murdered was the fiancée's bridesmaid!!!).

This book is not a police procedural, nor is it a detective thriller. What I loved so much about this book is that it focuses on the families of everyone involved in the situation of the murder. It deals with the real-life implications of crime and the mistakes of youth, as well as PTSD. It is not a distant, removed story; it is a vibrant tale that deals with some very relevant and also very timeless issues. The Truth We Bury makes some especially intriguing cases about PTSD, so if you are at all interested in psychology and the military you might really find this aspect of the story valuable.

Sissel's storytelling is another factor in my enjoyment of this novel. She uses very simple language throughout the novel; no big words. But the fact that the language used in the book was simple does not mean that the book itself is not well-developed. In fact, being that The Truth We Bury is a story with so much nuance and attention to detail in the plot and characterization alone, I am very glad that Sissel did not choose to use complicated diction. I actually enjoyed the novel more because I didn't have to spend so much time deciphering sentence structure and unraveling diction that I was not grasping the meaning of what was going on in the sentences.

But, as you might notice, I only gave this story four stars. That's mainly because for the first 25% of the story or so, I found that the pacing of the plot was pretty slow. I was having a hard time getting into the story even though I was still flipping pages, due to the fact that the plot was bogged down by a lot of dialogue, some of which I felt was unnecessary. I definitely skimmed a lot in the first 25%, and I wish I didn't have to. Anyway, this is a solid book. I enjoyed reading The Truth We Bury very much, and I will certainly be picking up more of Sissel's novels. I recommend this book to, as I said, people interested in psychology and the military, as well as to anyone looking for a good murder mystery that is not necessarily a police procedural-type story (and, for that matter, anyone who wants a quick and interesting beach read!).

Kudos to Barbara Sissel, author of "*THE TRUTH WE BURY*" for such an exciting and descriptive and entertaining story. The genres of this novel are Women's Fiction, Adult Fiction, Mystery and Suspense.

The author describes her characters as conflicted and complicated, and flawed. The story is narrated by the alternating perspectives of two mothers, whose children are about to get married. Both families are dysfunctional in many ways and have SECRETS. Shea and AJ are engaged to be married in a few weeks. Both mothers find fault with their children's significant other, and are truly not happy about the impending marriage.

One of the girls in the Bridal party is found dead in AJ's apartment and all clues seem to indicate that AJ might be responsible. AJ has PTSD from being in Afghanistan, and in the past he has made some bad choices and has a temper. There is a major problem that no one seems to know where AJ is. Is AJ guilty?

This novel has twists and turns, and some characters are very suspicious. There are other murders, and threatening actions that takes the reader on some suspenseful adventure.

Barbara Sissel brings up questions that are so relevant today. How should victims of PTSD be accepted and treated? How can family secrets of the past affect family relationships? How should a person accused of a crime be treated? How do you show acceptance of differences in physical appearances and social status?

What happens when your son is accused of murder and all the evidences seem to point towards him being guilty. He is also on the run and nowhere to be seen, do you doubt his innocence or do you keep being adamant that all must be a misunderstanding and he is just a victim? This is what *The Truth We Bury* tries to explore and it does it pretty well with the dual perspective of two mothers: the mother of AJ, the man everyone believes to be a murdered, and the mother of Shea, the woman he is supposed to marry.

The dual perspective works wonderfully, providing two contrasting perspective that really help the reader stay on the top of the problem and view the whole story from a bird's-eye view. Normally in thrillers that deal with murders from the perspective of people close to the suspect it is easy to get carried away and take their judgment as the absolute truth. In this case because we get the point of view of two mothers both close to the suspect and the victim, but who believe completely different things, the dynamic changes a bit.

Lily, AJ's mother, desperately wants her son to be innocent and she believes despite his dark past that now seems more ominous than ever, she still believes him to be incapable of such a deed. Add to that the fact that she was never close to him because of her own past mistakes, and you can add a lot of guilt and regret to the mix.

Then you have Dru, Shea's mother, who wants nothing else than to protect her baby girl and keep her as far away as possible from her fiancé who she never approved of and who now appears to be a cold blooded murdered. Of course, Shea wants nothing of that and just as Lily believes AJ had nothing to do the murder.

This come and go between perspectives is extremely entertaining, both women will have to make compromises if they want to work together and find out the truth and protect their children and family. The book starts strong and it eases a bit half-way in but after the half-point it just won't let you go once the revelation of what really happened starts to dawn on the reader and then on the characters.

What I liked about this book was that it laid all of its cards on the table, no hiding-information-from-the-reader-to-make-a-plot-twist-work, which I'm honestly starting to hate. Instead, if you paid enough attention all the revelations will be at your grasp before they are revealed to the characters, which I don't find to be a problem in a thriller. I don't have to be shocked in order to be entertained, the characters and the situations they found themselves in did all of that. The only thing that I did find underwhelming was the big truth that the title of the book hints at, it was obvious from the start and I found it hard to believe that it was such a surprise to the characters.

Overall this was a great domestic drama filled with suspense. The dynamic between the two families made for a tense read, with all the slow build-up and conflict that gradually accumulates throughout the novel, something has to give.
