On the day he was sentenced, Alexenko vowed that she would no longer be a statistic and would do whatever she could to help police on behalf of other rape victims. In 2011, she founded Natasha's Justice Project (NJP), a nonprofit committed to ending the rape-kit backlog.

This unflinching memoir chronicles her journey from trauma to triumph. Despite personal setbacks and bureaucratic obstacles, Alexenko refuses to give up on her determination to raise awareness of a problem even worse than she imagined, as tens of thousands of untested rape kits languish in crime storage facilities across the country. Written for fellow survivors, their families, law enforcement, and anyone impacted by rape, her deeply personal story is a testament to the power of one person to make a profound change.

This can be a very tough book to go through due to the nature of the events described, but it never gets hopeless or depressing. I like the way the author portrays her journey from one dreadful night to being able to advise those creating legislation. It's all written with honesty and sensitivity, not claiming to have the final answer. This is how one person chose to deal with her pain.

Besides the life story herself, there is the infuriating story of the thousands of rape kits that went untested for more than 10 years, some even being destroyed to make room. That meant thousands of victims getting no justice and thousands of dangerous attackers free on the streets. Luckily this is being slowly tackled. Not the same can be said about overall attitude towards victims - if you don't cry enough, cry too much, if you drink, all of these can suddenly make you less of a victim. I was shocked that the defense lawyer found it fitting to ask Natasha whether she was a virgin when the attack occurred. This is an important book to understand a systemic problem, as well as the effects of one crime.
