Velvet Touch was much ore than I expected, I definitely enjoyed reading it.

The author managed to pack so many stories and informtn in such little space without making it feel "info-dumpy", she was able to put softness and roughness together and make it always flow.

It is not just a romance or erotica or myster novel, it was a story about people with REAL and RAW impulses and how that plays into life, the good and the bad... and that was great!

Lily Bloom was brave enough to never shy away from describing the natural reactions of her characters with real, proper words, you won't find those cringy metaphores for sex or anatomic parts in here luckily - which I appreciated immensely. And I can assure you that this only improves the wrting and doesn't diminish its beauty or effectiveness at all.

I don't usually read erotica as a genere but I don't shy away from it either. The erotic scenes in this novel were raw and I apprecciated the realistic reppresentation of a "non-vanilla" relationship and BDSM.

Speaking of that, this book does something great: it has a lot of diversity in it, sometimes only mentioned, but it is there clear and addressed with its proper denomination. (Reps for BDSM, multiple partners relationships, girl/girl relationships, bisexual men, mental illness - especially PSTD). Remember, this is a short book with short chapters, all these things are sometimes only slightly touched on, some tho are more present and developed.

So many things happens, so many feelings are described and dealt with, especially the topic of dealing with grief.

The only thing I am still a bit confused nd "not-so-sure" about was the plot twist at the end that made the type of story change into something pretty different and switched the focus from human lives/feelings/relationships to a mistery maybe too abruptly. I didn't mind that there was also a mistery in it but it felt too rushed and almost as if it was part of another story but they ended up mashing together anyways. The novel tho, is "to be continued" as stated at the end, so I am sure it will all wrap up once it continues. And I'd lilke to continue with it and see where it goes!

Since this was billed as a new author, I really really wanted to like this book. Instead I felt like I was suffering through it. This book needed a skilled editor. Just a proofreading would not have worked. Too many choppy sentences, too many direction changes literally in the middle of a paragraph (if someone is doing one thing, and two words later is having a phone conversation, having been alone in a room, I think a little bit of description and narrative is needed), and mis-used words did me in. Misheard is NOT the same as "miss heard and that was just one of the proofing/editing errors that needed to be corrected for this to be readable. The story itself was disjointed, confusing, and not at all what I would call erotic. I was about half way through when I realized I was forcing myself to finish the book. To the author, please find a good editor,

someone who understands and READS erotic and steamy romance so that they can guide you into what this genre is about. This story could have been very very good because the basis was good.
