Not appreciating being kidnapped by the man who broke her heart or going back to the place where she found such happiness only to be disappointed, Farrah is determined to fight him to the bitter end. She can't believe how dumb he is in understanding her and not seeing the truth. He is so busy dumping all women into the same category as all the women he has known, he believes all women are the basically the same.

Once discovering the truth of their marriage, Farrah is hurt beyond all hurt and resolves to escape. Finally catching on that there is more to her and what happened years ago, Tariq gets to the bottom of things and realizes his emotions.
