Instead, Tucker is deployed pretty much right after they wed and practically disappears from the story. The story then focuses

more on Rena, her adjustments at being a new mom and a lot of focus on her work.

I appreciate that the author wanted to keep the book clean, however I think intimacy between the two would have been a big adjustment and not something to gloss over. I mean it was barely hinted at that they had even become intimate. In fact, when Rena finds out she is pregnant I was almost as shocked as she was. I just thought their relationship was odd.
