The second book in the series is Hunger Awakened. This one is just as hot and intense as the first one. Sebastian is already a vampire. He has been for the past 400 years. Well....not a full vampire. He's half vampire and half something else. Only Sebastian doesn't know what that something else is.

Vampires don't get sick, but Sebastian is. When Alice, a full human, shows him some compassion and helps him, he decides to keep her. He needs her and she needs him. She's down on her luck and her life expectancy is running low.

Alice is down on her luck when she runs in to a strange man that appears to not only be sick but might be bleeding. She's drawn to him due to her strong sense of decency and humanity but she ends up with something better than she could have ever imagined. She's got a ton of things that weigh her down but even with nothing in her name worth anything this massive sense of decency and caring makes her a very strong likable character. She's rightly afraid of Sebastian in some respects but doesn't run from him and instead stands up to him and ultimately for him when things come to a head. Born vampire Sebastian Kent guards the ruling council of the same vampire community that ostracizes him for his unknown heritage. A heritage Bast has spent hundreds of years researching in an exhaustive search to find out who his father is. Who *he* is. But Bast may have run out of time. He's in a human club on the hunt for the blood he needs to survive when he's overcome by a wave of scorching heat he doesn't understand and laid low by a debilitating sickness he can't control.

Alice Bowman has hit rock bottom. Fighting an illness that is slowly killing her, broke and homeless, she ekes out a pitiful existence in the dismal days between meager disability checks. She's just found her dinner in a dumpster next to a club when she hears someone being violently ill in the alley.

Helping a sick stranger get home isn't the safest thing she's ever done, but something about the man compels her to help him. Maybe it's just his obvious wealth combined with her desperate need. Every once in awhile I read a book that I like way more than I should. This second installment of Carney's Vampire Hunger series is one of them. I had quite a few issues with the story. The plot, which didn't extend much beyond Alice and Bast dealing with what's going on with him and his mysterious illness, was straightforward but a little one-note. There were some fairly tenuous connections, too, like the genealogy work Alice was so adept at, and the real stretch to provide her ancestry as a reason their connection was so intense. That bordered on eye-rolling to me.

Bast came off as a callous douchebag in the first chapter, then seemed to get a personality transplant without much story development to support it. He and Alice had some depth of character, though. More than the secondary and ancillary characters, anyway, as they were very two dimensional - when they were featured at all. And the big secret, Bast's paternal side, was blatantly, painfully obvious long before either character caught on to what he was becoming.

All of those issues really should have made this book more of a struggle for me, but to be honest...they didn't. I really enjoyed this book. I liked Alice very much from the moment she's introduced in the story, and once Bast's personality had that about-face, he was a great male lead as well. I liked how they related to each other and took care of each other when each was at their worst. They had great chemistry both in and out of the bedroom, and while definitely not very complex, the plot was more than enough to keep me invested in finding out their fate.

I haven't read the first book in the series but didn't need to. The world is fleshed out well enough in this book to provide a loose framework for the series. There are a couple of characters I assume were featured as the main romantic pair in the first book, but they're not involved until late in this one. They didn't have huge

roles, but Carney introduced them in a way that provided sufficient exposition for their participation without bogging down the narrative with a big info dump.

There is one word of caution I'd like to give about one element of the read. There's a lot of sex, and it's nice and hot, but I know some readers are put off by the "c" word when referring to a woman's naughty bits, and that happens a lot. I'm sort of ambivalent about it myself, as it's certainly not the most romantic terminology, but it didn't so much bother me as it just sort of disrupted the flow of the sex scenes a little. That may be a larger issue for some.

Though this certainly isn't what I would consider a perfect book, I was still thoroughly entertained. I'm not sure, after just this one read, where the series is heading, exactly, but I think I'll stick around for the ride. I'd be thrilled by a more layered plot and a bit more meat to the story, but honestly, Carney did quite all right in this second installment without it, so I won't really complain, either.

Wow. Maybe it's been a while since I read a really good paranormal romance... But holy cow, I loved *Hunger Awakened* by Dee Carney.

I'll admit – when we first meet our hero, Sebastian, I didn't really like him. He's a vampire and he's in need of blood and sex. So he goes to this club to find a willing donor for both. Umm, yeah... I don't know why but Sebastian just turned me right off. I guess since he's been around for hundreds of years, humans really are not much more than food for him and so he doesn't think too much about them. Doesn't like them, doesn't hate them. Maybe he's a little resentful because he NEEDS them but overall, doesn't care one way or another. I think that's why I didn't like him at first. Also, he's not like a lot of vampires; conflicted about killing innocents or stealing their blood or whatever. It needs to be done so he does it and he does it with the least amount of discomfort he can manage. It was so much like a business transaction... blech. But, that all changes when he starts feeling sick. But vampires don't get sick, right? Sure, he's a half vampire, half unknown but even still, he knows what he's feeling is wrong. There's this strange heat and incredible burning sensation starting inside him, trying to burn its way out. Then, he thinks he's about to throw up and that's REALLY something that vampires don't do!! To make matters worse, when he stumbles into the alley behind the club, someone is there to witness his humiliation. Little does Sebastian know that matters weren't worse. His life actually just got a whole lot better, even if it is about to be turned upside down.

That's when our heroine, Alice, steps in. She's homeless due to a strange medical condition so she's behind the club, searching Dumpsters for something to eat. When she spies a bag with a donut in it (only one bite

taken out of it! Score!), she also hears someone retching next to another Dumpster. She's not so far into the homeless life that she has stopped wanting to help people, so she goes and checks it out. Whoever it is certainly sounds worse off than Alice! And really, all she needs to do is see if they're ok and if not, use their phone to call an ambulance. Then her conscience will be clear and she can move on to figuring out where she can stay for the night. Of course, it's never that simple! I really liked Alice. Because of her rough life and medical issues, she has kind of a "Carpe Diem" kind of attitude and she lives for the moment as much as she can. I think most of us want to be more like that but life gets in the way and we end up worrying over things that are way off in the future or things that we can't change. When you're in Alice's situation, you don't really have the luxury of worrying about tomorrow because today is enough of a struggle. And even though Alice is homeless and has a junkie for a brother, she hasn't resorted to crime and she doesn't have a nasty attitude about people. Maybe it's unrealistic to think that someone who has to eat from Dumpsters wouldn't be angry at life but I found that she wasn't and I liked her even more.

When Alice and Sebastian get together, it doesn't make sense for either of them, strangers, human and vampire. But they are inexplicably drawn to each other. Alice gives Sebastian her trust and respect, which happens to be two things that Sebastian values and finds his own life to be lacking in. Sebastian gives Alice, safety and security, which we know she really needs. Aside from all that, Sebastian is really sexy and Alice finds herself truly living for the moment when she's in his arms. All worried about her illness or food or shelter just fade away and there is only Sebastian. Man, doesn't that sound awesome?! And for Sebastian, when Alice touches him, the heat subsides and he feels better. Of course, we, as the reader, know that they are destined for each other, but they don't know it. It's so great watching them learn more about each other and learn more about the other's illness. If the author could get the right kind of publicity, I think Alice and Sebastian could go down as one of those famous literary couples. THAT'S how great they were together!

I don't really have a lot of complaints about this book. I thought that Alice hid her illness from Sebastian a teensy bit too long, maybe? And I was thinking that her illness was going to have some grand significance due to how the blurb described her touch as being Sebastian's only relief but it really didn't. I mean, I thought she was going to be a new kind of vampire or something. But she's human. Whether or not she STAYS human is something you'll have to read the book to find out! By the way, I think the "illness" that Sebastian is suffering from is awesome and cool but I won't reveal what it is. I thought the story had great pacing and the characters were really well written. Sure, I didn't like Sebastian at first but that's something that I really love to have in a romance novel: a character that you don't like or identify with at first, finally coming around to being the hero/heroine you WANT them to be.

Bast is attracted to Alice and hires her against his better judgment, to help him trace his genealogy to discern the reasons for his mysterious illness. An illness that only dissipates beneath the cool touch of Alice's touch and kisses.

As Alice and Bast explore their growing passion, Bast's mysterious illness morphs into something incredible and dangerous. So dangerous in fact that certain individuals will stop at nothing to ensure Bast never recovers...even if that means death.

Hunger Awakened is a hot and steamy erotic paranormal romance. Dark and sensual, it is balanced by touches of humor and whimsy that allows for a fast paced read. Easy to follow, the world building and character development allows us to slip easily into this secretive and highly guarded world of vampires and the harsh politics that rule their domain. Though Hunger Awakened is connected to two other books (Hunger Revealed and Hunger Aroused) it readily stands on its own and reading the other two first isn't necessary.

I enjoyed meeting Bast and Alice and watching their romance develop. Though the sexual escapades happen fairly quickly, I enjoyed the fact that the "I love you" wasn't as tossed at us as quickly. They both have issues that need addressing and Carney takes her time developing them so that there is a reasonable resolution for both parties. There is also the small problem of Bast not being human. Alice's reactions are quite believable in that aspect. She often wonders if she's crazy and is unsure at times if she is considered friend or food.

Both our protagonists are intelligent, caring, and their sexy and humorous dialogue keeps the storyline entertaining. Bast is not what I would quite call a true alpha male. He is strong and protective but he respects and listens to Alice. I don't get that bossiness vibe from him as I did with some of the others. Alice in turn is equally as strong and protective and I love how she has no qualms about letting Bast or anyone else know they are not behaving towards her in a respectable fashion. Bast's illness is quite ingenious and I admit to laughing when the reasons behind it are finally revealed.

Secondary characters (some from previous books) make appearances and add to the overall development of the plot lines. Each one has the ability to star in their own book and it says a lot about an author who can develop a character to that point in such a short time.

The storyline and ending is predictable, but I liked the roads Carney uses to bring it to fruition. Hunger Awakened is a welcome addition for PNR readers who love strong heroes and heroines and a sexy storyline that is a bit darker and grittier than the norm.

I don't know about you guys, but I just get the urge to read some vampire romance now and then. I think it's the pleasure/pain nature of the romance, I mean you just know there'll be biting involved which is, you know, hot :D So I jumped at the chance to read this 'little' darling here. It's 'little' because it's a good length novel, like 90k words or something. And I loved every one of them.

I must mention I didn't read the other titles in this series. And I didn't find a name for it, so I called it Hunger just because all the titles so far contain the 'Hunger' word, so, you know. The main thing is if you like on of them there's more where that came from. See them here on Dee Carney's page.

To begin with, I loved the world of the read. We're dealing with vampires of the regular blood-drinking, smex-needing kind (yum!), some werewolf appearances, and, brace yourselves: dragons make a guest appearance as well. I love diversity and seeing more paranormal mixed in is always fun. The whole Council concept was fun, especially the way Sebastian and Alice dealt with it. No, not giving details to spoil your read.

Sebastian (yes, I like full names and especially this one, so no Bast going on for me, lol) was a cool vampire. Old enough, tough enough, hungry enough for something. Luckily he found his something. He was charismatic, funny, strong where it was needed and yet vulnerable. I really liked that, the fact that he was balanced and felt. He was very real, in a if-vampires-existed kind of way.

Alice was awesome too, she had a tough background and a tough present when she met Sebastian. She was very considerate, thoughtful and loyal, I really liked that about her. She was also vulnerable but she actually came off as stronger than Sebastian in places, they completed each other.

Their chemistry was very hot from the beginning, the whole hunger thing going on from the get go. But the relationship wasn't instalove, it developed as the story progressed and it was sweet, in fact. Their one on one was hot but not graphic.

I liked them as a pair and individually, but I wasn't super crazy about them. Probably because they weren't as tortured as I might have liked, lol. Keep in mind though that I'm the evil reader type, I love them as tortured and twisted as can be.

Outside of the romance arc there was paranormal intrigue, mystery revolving around Sebastian, tensions in the Council, inner conflict - a lot of yummy, to make a long story short. It wasn't agitated action but I loved the pace of events and how things got resolved. This is my kind of read, where the action outside of the romance isn't too over the top. I like my focus on the romance as much as possible and this novel gave me that.

An interesting exploration of vampire politics, or what might be vampire politics. There's a very uneasy relationship between vampires and, well, everyone else. Also within vampires themselves the current government seems to be full of uptight jerks and it's a fairly new organization so it is due for a little realignment. That is going to cause upheaval.

Carney's vampires seem to feed on blood and sex, but I wasn't really sure.

Impossibly rich, Four-hundred year old vampire Sebastian is caught in the middle of changes he doesn't understand having to do with the unknown father. That's how he meets Alice. They are drawn to each other - she seems to be an antidote for whatever ails him. She's down on her luck, but seems really smart. I found her character to have a very logical mind, and a warm and caring personality. He's a bit more expected; and in the first few pages he's a real assbat.

These two are really "star-crossed." And Carney makes the journey pretty exciting. Well, I found the beginning a bit slow, but the rest was sexy and engaging, and the last fifty pages made my exercise time fly by. I can't say it's terribly unpredictable. But it's still a fun ride.

It's fun, and sometimes thrilling. The depth of loyalty the two rapidly feel for each other is moving. I think if

you really like PNR on the gritty side, this will be a good choice for you.

Sebastian Kent has a problem. He is a vampire. Ok well that's not the problem the problem he is only half vampire. He doesn't know what the other half of him is. He's been trying to figure it out forever. He's also the head of guard who protects the Vampire Council and if they find out he's toast. Alice Bowman is sick like really sick. Down on her luck, no money and no place to live. Literally eating out of trash cans when she happens upon Sebastian. So, I enjoyed some parts quite a lot, some parts not so much, and overall it was just fine.

Alice is homeless and hungry when she happens upon a man who appears to be sick. The author infuses the character with a huge amount of decency from the start, and it immediately made Alice very likable, despite some questionable decisions she makes down the road.

Sebastian - Bast - is a hybrid vampire who's always been looked down upon because his father is unknown and because he's exhibited non-vampire traits. He's been looking for his Sire nearly his whole life, without much luck. Part of the group of vampires hired to protect the vampire council, he's a seasoned fighter, but still struggling with not being fully accepted due to his parentage. When a sudden, inexplicable illness befalls him, he's surprised yet grateful when a young human woman comes to his aid.

He's drawn to her, not only because she represents a food source, but also because she seems to be able to soothe the pains his sudden illness brought forth. He realizes that he's a danger to her and tries to get her to leave, but also wants her to stay. His vulnerability and devotion to Alice was very enjoyable.

Alice has a few TSTL moments in the book, and also a few moments that made me question her sanity. Then again, she's also ballsy and while she is afraid of Sebastian, she has enough backbone to stand up to him.

Their relationship is sexually charged from the start, what with Sebastian drinking her blood causing her to have a big O, and him having inappropriate thoughts about the spot between her legs, and having sex with her making him feel so much better. The insta-lust was a bit off-putting, but since this is supernatural/fantasy, I was willing to overlook it. The author did a good job of letting them open up to each other slowly, but then also included the soulmate factor, again dipping into that trope to explain (I guess) the immediate draw.

The sex scenes were plentiful (especially considering they've only known each other for just a little while) but also seemed somewhat repetitive in their execution. Missionary appears to be all Sebastian knows, and the descriptions of the scenes sounded very much alike.

The overall plot was quite good, and I very much enjoyed the fact that Alice had street smarts and good logic when it counted. Her standing up to the council had me smiling and atta-girling her.

The characters were well fleshed out and not superficial or one-dimensional. Both had deep secrets that were slowly revealed, even though not all questions were answered. There's also a bit of brand name dropping, which was unnecessarily distracting as it served no purpose. I'm not the kind of reader who's impressed with that sort of thing, and when writing from a male perspective, the elaboration on what brand after

shave/perfume or watch or clothes someone is wearing makes me question the purpose.

What really threw me for a loop was that Sebastian was eventually revealed to be half dragon. Early on, while he's with Alice at his apartment, he grows wings. Cool. Then the wings disappear. His nostrils breathe smoke. Very cool. And still, nobody makes the connection until he transforms into a scaly, winged sort of vampire dragon in front of other, full-blooded vampires and the council he's sworn to protect.

And when we get the explanation for the insta-love/lust/attraction, I thought I was being punk'd.

Overall, I did enjoy this book. The author did a great job with the characters and the plot. I felt drawn to them both, and that's part of what makes a good book - making a connection with the protagonists. Unfortunately, some of the issues I had prevented it from receiving four stars.

This is the type of book, with a swoon-worthy hero and a likable heroine, that should be read on a nice summer's day swinging in a hammock with a cool glass of iced tea.
