Koontz's writing is immensely realistic and intense; he puts you physically there in the middle of things. You, the reader, are really there, witnessing the action and the characters' terror, whether you like it or not. And because you can't put the book down, you're stuck there 'til the (gruesome?) end.

This book is composed of three novels: The Servants of Twilight, Darkfall, and Phantoms.

In the Servants of Twilight, a relentless, fanatic cult led by a psychotic psychic, Grace Spivey, hunts down a young boy, Joey Spavello, whom they believe with all their driven faith is the Antichrist. And they will stop at nothing to end him before his reign can begin.

Single mother of Joey, Christine Spavello, seeks the succor of private detective Charlie Harrison, and the three are soon swept into a nightmare from which they cannot wake up until either Joey or Spivey is killed. Readers will be confronted with questions of who is really satanic in this novel, and whether Joey is simply an ordinary child. While the bullets fly and tears fall, a romance grows between Charlie and Christine, despite, or perhaps because of, the deadly race for sanctuary from their malevolent hunters.
