I hoped my son would find it as funny as a zombie goldfish book he recently read, but this story was a little scary for younger kids who are afraid of zombies. It is quite funny for mid grade readers because it is more humorous than scary. The characters have become used to living a "normal" life (TV, water, food, homes, school, etc) inside the city walls. The "deadbeats" or zombies live outside the walls. All is safe and settled into "normal".

Young Matt and his friends were looking forward to receiving sword / fantasy games to play together until Matt's parents decided to surprise him with a pet hamster. My Zombie Hamster is ... well, it's pretty much exactly what it says on the box. There's this hamster, you see. And he's a zombie...

Naturally, there's more to it. Let's start with the official synopsis:

Matt Hunter and his buddies are looking forward to Christmas — actually, they're looking forward to receiving the latest sword-and-fantasy video game. But Matt's parents have other thoughts — they give him a fluffy little mammal, a hamster called Snuffles, for the holiday. And his grandmother makes it worse by giving him a hamster cage and wheel. But the hamster isn't all that cute — at least not after part of its cheek and belly fall right off — without bothering it a bit! And why is it staring at Matt with black beady eyes and a

lean and hungry look?

Say hello to Anti-Snuffles, the zombie hamster! Or better yet, run!

This is a middle grade book set in the very near present. The zombie apocalypse has led to a society of walled cities and towns, but aside from the zombie-hunting cops wandering around to make sure you're still alive, and the presence of life chips that go off when you expire (alerting said zombie-hunting cops to come and dispose of your potentially brain-hungry corpse). On the other hand, Matt still has to go to school, still references present-day pop culture, and still lives a life that's in many ways pretty similar to most kids these days.

Similar except for the never-named-but-clearly-hinted-at ex-movie star who's come to town to take charge of zombie security, of course. And the mayor's big pet contest. And of course, Anti-Snuffles, who may or may not be building an army of undead critters...

It's a quick read, one the author describes as "a cross between Shaun of the Dead, The Goonies, and The Diary of Adrian Mole." The short, daily chapters are interspersed with Matt's lists of things to do, whether it's his plan for breaking into [SPOILER] or the things he plans to do once he becomes a megamillionaire.

Despite the undead hamster, the book isn't particularly gross or scary, so it shouldn't give young kids nightmares about the family pets. On the other hand, reading it as a not-quite-40-year-old, that also meant the stakes didn't feel quite as urgent to me.

One of my favorite parts was a subplot with one of Matt's friends, something I can't really talk about without spoiling things. But it was an unexpected development, and I really enjoyed the way the characters handled it.

It's a light-hearted story about a boy vs. his undead hamster. What else is there to say?

This children's/young adult story takes place in the near future where zombies have taken over the world and civilization has been moved behind the safety of high walls. All is well until young Matt asks for a video game for Christmas but instead is given...a hamster. Not so bad, you're probably thinking. It's not, until the hamster dies and turns into a zombie. Little Snuffles, or Anti Snuffles as he's now known, manages to escape and seems to be on a mission to turn every animal, pet or not, into a zombie. I found this book to be quite entertaining and fun to read. It's high on the humor and low on the gore, even though it's about zombies. I can see this being a big hit with kids, especially boys.

All Matt wanted for Christmas was a Runesword, a fancy video game controller like his friends Charlie, Calvin, and Aren were likely to get. Instead, he got a hamster. A hamster that did nothing but eat and sleep and before too long turn into a necrotized slavering quadruped zombie mastermind.

Matt and his friends live in the walled town of Edenvale. Zombies prowl the woods on the other side of the wall, while inside, citizens - and pets - are implanted with "lifechips" that inform the Zombie Squad the moment their spark of life sputters out. Except the Zombie Squad never comes for Charlie's dead hamster, and after escaping his cage, Snuffles is spotted around town turning other animals into zombies and plotting doom for the town's annual Pet Show.

Packed with references to action and sci-fi movies, *My Zombie Hamster* zips along like a fluffy little rodent in an exercise ball. Minor gore will please *Goosebumps* fans, but it's not enough to keep the squeamish away.

My Zombie Hamster is a very clever story of a young boy who lives in a town that is not only overtaken by zombies, but by animal zombies as well, led by his late hamster, Snuffles, or Anti-Snuffles(a pet he never wanted in the first place, but received from his often clueless parents for Christmas). Young readers will enjoy the adventures of Matt and his friends as they try to outwit the animal zombies, while protecting themselves from the formerly human zombies at the same time. When Matt's friend Charlie is bitten by a zombie, she is transformed into one herself (that's how it happens), but to everyone's astonishment she possesses all the kind qualities she had when alive and none of the unpleasant qualities of the undead. The characters are very clever, the story is amusing, and the local politics are hysterical. This is a good story for elementary school students who read chapter books, middle schoolers, and read aloud in the classroom activities.

While I enjoyed this story, I was not as captivated by it as much as I have been by other books in this genre. However, I am old enough to be the grandmother of anyone who reads this, and my four-star rating reflects my opinion of this book's appeal to the target audience.

Four Books in One, All Good

This really is a great example of how you can mash four different middle grade genres together and come up with a funny, exciting and very appealing book. This is a family foibles book, an alternate world book, a zombie book, and an adventures of a gang of four knuckleheads book.

The family foibles are along the lines of the Wimpy Kid pattern. Mom and Dad are unique and distinct personalities and a lot of the narrative is built on our kid hero's bemused but affectionate recounts of their behavior. (His explanation that he got a hamster instead of the video game he wanted because his parents were obviously experimenting "to see what kind of adult they can create by constantly disappointing me as a child" is priceless. As is his history of failed New Year's Eve parties.)

As to the alternate world, hero kid lives in a walled city. The city is walled to keep zombies out and there is a complete world built on remote Zombie Zappers, the Zombie Squad, citizens wearing life chips that alert the Zombie Squad if anyone dies and goes zombie, and so on.

The zombie action comes in the form of a pet hamster, which was a smuggled pet, got out, got zombified and is now terrorizing the populace inside the walls while our hero tries to capture it.

Finally, since our hero needs the help of a posse, we get his best friend, Charlie, a wiseguy take charge gal, and his two next best friends - Calvin, who's a bit dim and Aren, who's the brains of the operation.

And of course the glue that holds this all together is Matt, who has to deal with his family, explain how his city works, agonize over the zombie hamster problem, and keep his gang moving in the right direction. Matt takes you into his confidence right off the bat and his intimate and open style is winning.

One of Matt's most appealing characteristics is his exaggerated sense of calm and common sense - exhibited as the plot, his schemes, and the complications of having a zombie hamster spin more and more out of control. It is the working of the middle grade mind in the midst of chaos, (sort of like a young Buster Keaton), that I found very amusing and appealing.

The humor ranges from slapstick to clever wordplay. (Max names the zombie hamster, originally named "Snuffles", the "Anti-Snuffles". Girl pal Charlie likes "Auntie Snuffles" and will only help Max if they agree

the hamster's name is Auntie Snuffles. Max agrees, but only uses "Auntie" ironically. Dim friend Calvin stares at a carton of orange juice for half an hour because it says "concentrate" on it. I just think that's pretty sharp and clever stuff for middle grade zombie humor.)

So, funny, engaging, loaded with clever ideas and puckish humor, and populated by likeable characters. A very nice find.

It's a fun and breezy early middle-grades book. Despite being themed around zombies, it is very un-gory and un-gritty, with some nice themes around friendship.

The precocious narrator is a fun little boy with a strong sense of how the interpersonal dynamics work around him, and is, unlike many books for this age group, blessed with parents who are present and engaged in his life, even if they don't know all the hijinks he and his friends are getting up to.

For the right kid, with a warped sense of humor, I think this is a fun book somewhat off the beaten path.

Matt lives in a world exactly like ours, with cell phones and YouTube and school and cars, except that Matt's world is full of zombies. All towns are behind massive walls to protect residents. When Matt gets a hamster for Christmas instead of the gaming console he wanted, it quickly dies, becomes a zombie, escapes, and Matt is sure it's building a zombified animal army to attack the town. He enlists the help of his friends Charlie (a girl), Calvin, and Aren (a boy), but soon they're all too busy with a field trip sponsored by their new town Warden to do anything else. The Warden wants to teach them how to defend themselves in the wild against zombies, but some get a little too close—with, well, interesting results. For Matt and his friends as well as Anti-Snuffles, the zombie hamster.

This is fluff, only a teaspoon deeper than Scooby Doo. There's no logic—how could you have a world with all industry, agriculture, infrastructure, pop culture, movies, etc. intact if no one can leave their towns? But that's really not the point. Kids who like this kind of humor will enjoy it, and that's its only goal. There's no character development or grand revelations, though Matt's loyalty is commendable. From the ending, looks as though a sequel may be planned.

And I do have to give points to the author for name-checking The Famous Five.

All Matt wants for Christmas is a Runesword so he can play the game with his friends online. What he gets is a hamster named Snuffles. Then Snuffles dies and turns into a zombie hamster. Snuffles escapes outside and starts building his zombie pet army, turning all the pets and animals in town into zombies. Of course there are people who are zombies also, but they are all outside of the town walls. Matt and his friends Charlie, Calvin and Aren devise several plans to stop Snuffles before he is discovered and Matt and his family get in trouble. All of these fail miserably. Then Charlie dies and becomes a zombie, but she isn't like the others. She still has her personality and doesn't want to eat brains. She is a new breed of zombie. Of course not everyone wants to find that out.
