A Good Kind of Trouble is a fun, quirky romantic mystery in the new Trouble in Twin Rivers series. The main characters in A Good Kind of Trouble are Lindsey Fox and Ben Gillespie. The story is told from their POVs in third person. I enjoyed this, because the reader sometimes gets to see their very different interpretations of the same event, such as the "bad date of epic proportions."

Speaking of that bad date, the gory details are revealed in bits and pieces, from each POV, beginning in Chapter 1. As a result, I was immediately caught up in the storyline. I was compelled to keep reading, to learn exactly what happens on the date, especially why Ben gets pepper-sprayed at the end of it.

And then I got caught up in Lindsey's paranoia — a burglarized apartment, maybe; a stolen laptop, maybe; an attempted mugging, maybe; many intimidating phone messages, maybe; slashed tires on multiple occasions, maybe — a multitude of unsubstantiated claims, enough to cause her co-workers and boss at the newsroom to believe her to be a crazy "drama queen" just seeking attention. But maybe all of her claims are really true, and they really are out to get her. [Now you're hooked too, aren't you?]

In addition to paranoia, A Good Kind of Trouble by Ellie Ashe contains incomprehensible legalese, romance, suspense, surveillance, corruption, whistleblowers, orchids, intrigue, municipal bonds, boondoggles, more romance, nuisance money, evil bankers, federal agents, looming bankruptcy, mysteries galore, and nut-buckets with blogs.

Be on the lookout for these famous names — Steve McQueen, Michael Jackson, Laura Petrie, Laura Ingalls, Charlie Rose, and Rolex. Find out if there is a connection between (view spoiler). Learn how a small group of (view spoiler) and saves the day!

Author Ellie Ashe's experience as a journalist and a lawyer gives authenticity to her descriptions of Lindsey's journalism and Ben's law practice. This realism added a great deal to my enjoyment of A Good Kind of Trouble. The action, especially near the end of the book, is particularly exciting and suspenseful. I couldn't put the book down, and had to keep reading, all the way to the (very good!) ending.

I know this is going to sound strange, but I really like this cover. It grabbed my attention with it's very retro and classy look. When I read the blurb, I got hooked by the idea of a relationship springboarding off a very bad date. Images of Blind Date staring Bruce Willis and Kim Bassinger were running through my head. (Hush all you haters, I liked the movie!)

Ben is an attorney in a big firm, nearly done putting in his time to make partner. He is currently doing insurance work, mainly settlements, for big insurance companies. It's not what he would like to be doing, but with his student loans hanging over his head, he doesn't feel he's in a place to make the move to representing clients against those big corporations.

Lindsey is a reporter working for the local newspaper. Her parents are two fairly well known names in the journalism business; her mother a war correspondent and her father the editor of one of the larger newspapers. And although she grew up with journalism in her blood, she doesn't want to just trade on her parent's success and is working her way up the hard way.

When Ben is assigned by the court to represent Lindsey in a contempt of court charge, he gets drawn into her current investigation. It becomes clear to Ben that Lindsey is being stalked and harassed. And although he tries really hard to not get involved, he can't seem to stop remembering the really good parts of that first date.

The POV on this book switches back and forth between Ben and Lindsey, giving us time in both their heads and daily lives. This book had a very realistic vibe to it, and after reading that the author spent time as both a lawyer and journalist, it was obvious why. The mystery wasn't complicated, but had enough twists to keep me entertained and interested. I thought this book was really well done, especially for a self-published author. I gave it 4 stars.

This was probably by far one of the most cliché book ever but it didn't stop me from enjoying every minute of it. The author pretty much followed every standard book to include a mystery, romance and suspense. There was the typical headstrong female lead and her male counterpart who obviously fall in love despite either of their differences and tendencies. There was also the typical corporate and government corruption. Then there was the usual backstabbing and people who were involved realizing that they had been left behind. Of course, we shouldn't forget the typical kidnapping/stalking element in the book as well. Overall, a recipe for a good short read.

The ending was pretty much already set in stone by the time I opened to the first chapter. I knew who was going to fall in love (DUH), who the "enemies" were (aka the people behind the corruption) and the downfall of everything. The book basically had three major parts: the story building where Lindsey and Ben are introduced and you find out their backstory and whatnot; the investigation as they both start to uncover the mysteries (and corruption) of the town they're in; and finally the conclusion when everything falls into place into a neat pile including the last minute struggle between the "heroine" and the people behind the whole thing. Oh yea, and finally the kiss to seal the romance between Lindsey and Ben. So there was honestly no surprises whatsoever. I can't even be like SPOILER alert because it's really not a spoiler if everything can be figured out within minutes.

For me, the only true twist to the story was the affairs – one of them was quite obvious but the other was kind of surprise to me mainly because I guess I thought one affair was enough but clearly it wasn't. However, once that was revealed, it was quite obvious what the outcome was going to be.

I do think that the characters were a bit lacking in personality because they were cliché and pretty much one-sided. There wasn't any hidden depths to them or any inner angst or whatever. They were straightforward characters and since they got the job done in a decent manner, I can't really say anything else about them.

Since I did read this book via audiobook, I also have to comment on the narrator. Overall, she did a good job but she kept pronouncing “harassment” wrong – she kept saying it as “Harris ment” instead and it kept bothering me because the author used this word quite often and the narrator kept pronouncing it incorrectly. It was to the point that I was like omg its HA RASS MENT. Though, to be fair, it might be one of those words where it depends on where you are so the pronunciation is different but I have literally never of “harassment” pronounced as “harris ment”.

Overall, while the story was very, very cliché and the ending was pretty obvious, I still enjoyed it immensely. It was easy to get into the story since the writing style was also very simple and there was clearly a lot of interesting action going on. For the last 6 months she has been receiving strange phone calls, she is being followed etc. but unfortunately her colleagues and her editor think she is a drama queen. She has been on one date with lawyer Ben Gillespie and it ended disastrous when she accidentally sprayed him with mace, thinking him to be an attacker.

When Lindsey is thrown in a holding cell on a bogus contempt charge Ben is appointed to help her get out of jail. Hence they meet again after months. After Ben sees someone following and chasing Lindsey he saves her and brings her home.

I thought it refreshing that Ben is not just a suave, handsome rich lawyer. He has student loans and actually hates his job but hopes to make partner so he can pay off his loans. He is impressed by Lindseys love and passion for her job and decides to help her after they realize her troubles stem from the article she wants to write about the proposed building of a sports stadium.

A fast paced and excite romantic suspense novel. When someone sends newspaper writer Lindsey Fox papers indicating corruption in city hall she feels compelled to track down proof that she can use or the identify of her source to make sure it is valid, but it becomes obvious that someone has figured out that she is on the trail and that person is trying to intimidate her into stopping. If intimidation doesn't work, the stakes will only go up. In one effort to make her back off or discredit her, she is thrown into jail for not showing up in court because the subpoena never reached her. The attorney that the court assigns to address her bail is a man she hoped never to see; in fact, she has to decide if she would rather deal with him or stay in jail. As they leave the court he becomes the first witness to the danger she is in and becomes determined to help her out.
