Stephen Randel's novel The Chupacabra is an adventurous comedy that illustrates Randel's impressive talent for storytelling as he weaves together an extensive cast of diverse characters that all intersect at the end. At first I was a little overwhelmed by the amount of characters I needed to get a grasp on to get immersed in this book, but it really didn't take long for the story to pull me under. The story is constantly changing between its ensemble cast member's perspectives, so it's important that the reader stay on their toes; however each character is so memorable that it's impossible not to gain interest quickly.

The backbone of the novel is El Barquero, a murderous weapons smuggler working for the Mexican cartels. Through El Barquero, Randel impressed me when I found myself rooting for the "bad guy" much more often than not. Although El Barquero is capable of killing people without much consideration, somehow the author still gives him enough humanity that I found myself wanting him to succeed in his final operation.

On the other side of the coin is Avery, one of the most hilarious literary character I've read in a long time. Avery is a chubby, nerdy, loner with more than just a screw loose. He is obsessed with conspiracy theories and his interaction with others, including the insane letters he writes to corporations, are reason alone to read this book. Avery takes himself so seriously and is so self absorbed, that he has no real understanding of the precarious situations in which he puts himself.

El Barquero and Avery are just two of the many colorful characters that drive this book and have made it one of my favorites of the year. The intensity of characters like El Barquero and the cartel boss are more easily digested by foils like Avery or General X Ray of STRAC-BOM, a 7 man civilian militia, who proves that there actually are characters even more clueless to dangerous situations than Avery. These characters help the scenes switch quickly between intense and comedic very efficiently.

While The Chupacabra is an entertaining novel, it also has enough depth to make the reader consider things beyond its pages, an indicator of any great and memorable book. Through characters like El Barquero, Avery, and General X-Ray, the reader might consider what drives someone to go to great lengths for what they believe in and how much of what they believe in is a result of their ego. I also learned by the end of the novel not to underestimate or overestimate certain characters; they all have their own strengths and weaknesses that help or harm them in very realistic ways come the climax of the novel.

I would really love to see this book turned into a movie with a blockbuster Hollywood ensemble cast led by Zach Galifianakis as Avery. I mean, the Mexican drug cartels have already become somewhat glamorized in Breaking Bad. Come on, Hollywood, when are you going to start listening to my blog? ;)

Bottom Line: If you want a laugh-out-loud adventure that will keep you on the edge of your seat, read this book right away! 4½/5 stars.

It took me a long time to finish this book and I don't have any real reason for it. It was just slow, so I won't rate it low because it really doesn't deserve a low rating just because I wasn't in the mood for it when I started reading.

There are a number of POVs and they all come together near the end of this crazy book. The characters best describe it. The author managed to tell a humorous (though dark) story even with serious themes: illegal aliens, remorseless assassins, drugs, cartels and a very high body count.

Avery Bartholomew Pendleton is a paranoid conspiracy nut. He constantly writes threatening or blackmailing letters to anyone who did something wrong (in his opinion). The problem with Avery is that is almost everyone. His letters are hilarious and show just how crazy he is. Avery is obsessed with finding a proof that chupacabras are invading the US. He is living with Bennet (a retired doctor who was married to his mother) and Bennet's son Kit, who has recently got back to Austin.

I loved the parts with civilian militia. General X-Ray and his men want to protect the border and prevent any illegal alien to cross over. The following passage best shows their awesomeness.

"After kick-starting the heavy dirt bike to life, he led the convoy of vehicles into the desert, only to return to base a few minutes later because Private Foxtrot had forgotten to lock the door to the HQ"

Who wouldn't like these guys as protectors?

The third group are Bennet's cousin Polly's friends. They are a bunch of great older ladies with their own

quirks. My favourite, Pearl, is a tiny fearless woman with a really big gun. She is always aggressive and Polly decided to help her. From changing the church to Pearl's to tai-chi lessons, this group of ladies is determined to make Pearl happier and less aggressive.

"The only sweating I want to do at my age," Pearl replied, "is with that good-looking administrator over at the retirement center. The one that looks like Denzel."

"Just do what Master Wu says," Jolene said. "Well, he might be Master Wu to you," said Pearl. "But he's just plain old Wu to me. You don't ask an old black woman to go calling someone Master."

Their constant banter is what makes them interesting and funny.

Those are the funny parts. The other side couldn't be darker. The main bad character is El Barquero, an assassin who decided it is time to retire and whoever is standing in his way gets killed. You get a glimpse of cartel life too.

First beware that this is no fantasy book nor Sci-Fi, it is an honest to God comedy book set in contemporary Texas. From the title I really did not know what to expect. The Chupacabra? I mean, I know what a chupacabra is and therefore I was kind of expecting a horror novel, indulging in gruesome details of terrifying blood-sucking monsters. Fortunately it is nothing like that, it is more the kind of story that will bring tears to your eyes. Why? Again Avery and Pearl. It is one of the most crack-pot books I've ever read. At the end, I just looked at it and thought, "Ya, this TOTALLY could happen!" I absolutely loved it! (Yes, I know, I'm using a ton of exclamation points; but well, I'm excited!)

When I first started the book, I was really worried that I'd picked up something that I wouldn't like. We start out with the story of El Barquero, a really evil and sinister man who is intent on moving his way up and out of the drug cartels. He shoots people down and slashes them up for the coyotes. He is the darkness in the story, and quite honestly, what gives it all a touch of real nastiness. But hey- these type of guys are out there for real I'm sure.

Enter the goofy odd character of Avery. He is one nugget shy of a Happy Meal. We are introduced to Avery by his step brother who has come home to Austin, TX, to assist his sick father. Avery stays camped out in his room and only goes out when he needs Mountain Dew – and then, only in his yellow track suit which he is convinced will keep him from being noticed. In the same town we get to know a group of crazy Bingo ladies, and their somewhat unconventional beliefs. The characters that were fascinating and had the most dimension to them were Avery, Miss Pearl, Ziggy the hippie and General X-Ray. Other characters such as Kip, Kip's father and so forth weren't as interesting as the ones I have mentioned. I also felt pity that I didn't spend a lot of time with the Mexican Godfather, err I mean Padre. Despite the numerous characters I didn't feel confused as to which one is which because the author gave them distinct voices and words. Their personalities really shone in the novel, and its the strongest aspect of the novel.

Theme:

Most unexpected moments do tie up.

Plot:

Its written in third person narrative from everyone's point of view. The author does warn ahead when points of view shift and he stays consistent when it comes to characters; that is with Avery and people tied up with him one gets comedy or slight romance, and with El Barquero and the agents one gets action and gore. Possibly the only exception is the STRAC-BOM, although I would think they fall more into comedy instead of suspense. There are many things going on in the book such as Aunt Polly and her friends trying to get Miss Pearl to calm down, (loved the church scene!) El Barquero dealing murders, Kip getting to know his friend once more, Maximilian the French Bulldog trying to eat trash, the agents trying to keep a lookout for STRAC-BOM and so forth, (not even done yet in saying important threads.) I do admit I had some trouble understanding El Barquero scenes and what exactly he was trying to do. Other than that though, the author has done a good job with sticking the mood to the characters and one knows what one gets when it comes to them.

He also wrote a sequel titled The Trail of Chupacabra. Nothing else is known of him.

Opinion:

I have to admit that I read this book second instead of first. The first one I have read was titled Trail of the Chupacabra, which was unexpectedly hilarious, fresh and enjoyable. I also do describe this one as fresh, hilarious and enjoyable, but not as much as the second book. I would have liked more Miss Pearl scenes I think and would have liked if the loose ends between Kip and a girl were tied up. Other than that the characters stay in character and a character sheet might have helped out with figuring out who's who in General X-Ray's STRAC-BOM as well as a necessity for false names. I did feel that points of view from the agents or Kip weren't necessary to the story. This book is a mixture of suspense and comedy which makes for a delightful read. There are action scenes along with comedy scenes. I have never even heard of Chupacabra, although apparently its best described as a demon coyote, or a goat-sucker, something Avery is obsessed with getting, along with Mountain Dew. I felt that the best parts were the letters from Avery to practically everyone.

Stephen Randel's tale of border woes brings us an eclectic mix of characters. First up is El Barquero or 'The Ferryman'. Ruthless to his muscled core, he plays cartels against each other in a bloody quest for money.

Avery Pendleton, an eccentric, caffeinated, conspiracy theorist, spends his days writing letters to CEOs & searching for cryptozoological beings. Overzealous militiamen comprise another motley crew. Using aliases & too much Southern pride, they wage their own war on illegal aliens. Along the way, we have a supporting cast of misfits who all play their part in the grand scheme of things- whether or not they know it.

Thickening the plot, all the characters are intertwined in one way or another. Presented into the plot neatly, it comes full circle & makes perfect sense. All the other humorous twists were good fun.
