Oh, wait, that's right.

But I honestly couldn't help myself. The blurb sounded really appealing and I couldn't find it anywhere in my local library so I just *had* to buy it.

Worst decision *EVER*.

The Secret Lives Of Emma: Beginnings is one of the most poorly written books I've ever read. It wasn't rampant with spelling or grammatical errors; I just felt that the author just wrote words that were associated with erotic romances and fucking, coupled them into sentences and then turned those sentences into a full novel (well, not exactly a full novel seeing how short it is; I've read novellas that are longer in width) and said, *Voila! It is done*. And all in the space of less than a day. It didn't feel like a lot of effort was spent on actually writing it; on fleshing the details out. There wasn't even a storyline!

Here be spoilers. (So stop reading this review if you want to read this book in the future)

The plot was basically:

- Girl Woman sees boy climbing over her fence.

- Women sees how hot he's gotten and starts daydreaming about him and his "youthful body". Below is a following passage from Emma's thoughts in the books when Jason is first introduced.

She liked the way his body was developing. He was a very attractive boy who would probably fill out too much as he grew older but for now he was lean and toned. She habitually teased him about his looks but it wasn't all play, she genuinely admired his adolescent beauty.

It was just....creepy. This is where the main heroine, Emma, started to feel like Celeste from Tampa. This is why older women dating younger guys get it rough and have lots of haters. And then she totally mind-raped him later.

Her imagination was building upon the chaste scene she'd just shared with Jason, improving the

dialogue, developing the themes and changing the outcome to suit her own immodest expectations. The fact that any involvement was impossible only made the subject more attractive to the fantasists.

But if someone did that to me...I'd be like:

Well, not really. But red alarms would certainly go off. And I'd maybe include a restraining order...maybe hire a couple of bodyguards anyway? But I digress. On with the "story".

-Woman (who's thirty) seduces boy (who's eighteen-years-old) who, by the way, is also the son of her neighbours

-Drama ensues. The boy finds another fuck-buddy. Woman is sad but moves on.

That's it. And the rest of book was made up of filler sex scenes, and not the hot, sensual type of sex scenes which make your naughty bits tingle but the ones which make you want to skim and skip past to the next part. Which I did. But the sex scenes that I read...I know they were meant to feel titillating but they weren't. It just made me feel dirty.

The characters (which usually redeem a book for me) were completely one-dimensional. There wasn't any hidden facets of their personality. It was actually blatantly stereotypical.

My Jason, Emma and David ~~Not including Paul because *sighs and shakes head* there are just so many reasons~~

Emma's the woman prowling for young men to get it on with. **Jason's** the naive guy who's unfortunate to get sucked in into her fantasies. **David** is the.....Well, he's basically the unsuspecting husband.

And this brings up another point for me. The last book I read was about cheating but I could actually understand why the couple did it. I *felt* for them. I was rooting for them in the long-term. But in *The Secret Lives Of Emma: Beginnings*, I couldn't understand Emma's reasoning at all. I'm fully disregarding her other argument where Emma's like:

I am not kidding, she is exactly like the aforementioned *Stranger*. She's always like, "*I am a woman with a great sexual appetite and my husband is not enough for me. Therefore I should find other men to screw.*" Faulty logic, much?

And then I found out that this is actually a trilogy and there are **Two. More. Books.** The first book was just filler so I can't think of anything that the second and third might be about unless it's about Emma cheating some more or David finding about it or something like that. Basically...just more sex.

I picked this up after reading a great review about it by the author Kylie Ladd on the Booktopia blog and was so glad I did. Emma Benson, 32, has been married for a year to David, a wealthy businessman who she loves, but is becoming increasingly frustrated by the constraints of marriage. Fortunately, a distraction arrives in the form of her eighteen-year-old next-door neighbour Jason, who, until now, has been a model student and a good and obedient son. He is also sexually inexperienced, but that soon changes as Emma sets out to give him an education he will never forget.

I absolutely loved this book - it somehow manages to be both incredibly hot and also literary in flavour, with some great insights into the characters' psychology. I loved reading about Emma's views on marriage (and her struggle between her love for her husband and her need to express her sexual identity) and Jason's growing sexual awareness. The need for secrecy added to the suspense - Emma and her husband are friends with Jason's parents who live next door and there is a constant danger of being discovered, a danger which Emma fully exploits for its erotic potential.

Overall, this seduction-of-an-innocent story is surprisingly realistic and contains plenty of totally hot, very graphic sex scenes that will leave you wanting more. I consumed this book in less than three hours and was left wishing I could read straight on to the next one (The Secret Lives of Emma: Distractions) which is supposed to come out later this year. Not everything is fully resolved by the end, but that didn't bother me as it leaves something to look forward to in the next one. A breath of fresh air in a genre that is overloaded with poorly written stories.

Before I start, I must admit, I haven't read Fifty Shades of Grey or any of the supposed spin-offs and had absolutely no inclination to do so. I read 100 pages of Grey because I thought I should – it sold bucket loads and as an author it would have been good research to work out why – but I honestly couldn't go any further. Erotic romance has just never been my thing. So, I'd never had any inclination to pick up The Secret Lives

of Emma series either. There were just too many other books on my TBR pile. I like a hot sex scene as much as the next person in a romance, but I'm more there for the romance than the sex.

And then a couple of weeks ago, I read an article online about the true identity of Natasha Walker, author of *The Secret Lives of Emma* and suddenly I was interested. You see, I'd recently met John Purcell, the author behind Natasha, at the Australian Romance Readers Convention and I was gobsmacked!!! Seriously, I would NEVER have picked this. I was really curious to see how John wrote from the point-of-view of a very sensual female and ordered the book (from Booktopia) immediately.

The Secret Lives of Emma begins with Emma Benson (32), a bored housewife, studying while sunbaking in her backyard. It is immediately apparent that she is an erotically-charged woman and has a past her husband is unfamiliar with. She's longing for more excitement in her life, but in particular her sex life. She's happy with her husband, David, who is apparently very good in bed, but she needs more. To quote the book, "She was a sexual glutton, but, like any good diet, her diet required variety." While Emma loves David (or so she says, we don't actually see much of this relationship), her views on marriage do not match those of the general public and thus some people might find her a distasteful character. Personally, I liked Emma (although it took me a while to work this out) and I enjoyed the book. I'm sure there are plenty of people in 'real life' like Emma but I enjoyed the book as a fantasy. I found Emma's daring and that of her young lover exciting and shocking all at once.

There are really only two characters in *Beginnings* – Emma and her 18 year old neighbour, Jason, whom she decides will be her project. She will teach Jason to be a good lover and reap her own pleasure in the process. Jason is an interesting character – he is the perfect son and student but Emma lures him into her torrid world and she becomes his focus above all else. There's mention of Emma's husband, her other lover Paul and a teenage girl who is after Jason, but they take up very little page space. The story is all about Emma and her illicit affair with her neighbour's son.

Maybe it is the illicitness of the situation that helps the chemistry leap off the page from chapter one. Although at first I wasn't sure I liked the idea of an affair between world-wise Emma and innocent Jason, I found myself turning the pages as their encounters heated up, desperate for them to consummate their affair. Jason develops more as a character than Emma – changing from a naive and guileless, albeit hot, school boy, into a man aware of his needs and the power they can have on him and others. If I had any complaint about the novel, it would be that there wasn't a deep emotional connection between the two lovers, but that didn't stop me being invested in them and their story.

I can't compare *The Secret Lives of Emma* to other books of this genre, but I can say that I thoroughly enjoyed it and will be ordering buying books two and three ASAP! It's an easy but clever read and I'm desperate to know what happens next in the life of naughty Emma.
