Welcome to Wolf River.

The story encompasses four generations as Wolf River twists and turns through the lives of several southern Manitoba families.

Their stories unfold in the Wolf River area near the tiny prairie town of Millfield, and in Winnipeg. The Christies and McCorries and their neighbors are bound together by tragedies and loss, secrets and promises, and the unforgiving social expectations of the times.

The Great Depression of the 1930's is a crushing juggernaut of economic circumstance and extreme weather conditions, and no one escapes its consequences.

A young woman's future is shaped by the devastating secret she bears; her best friend is burdened for life with the shared knowledge. A lonely teacher finds herself trapped in a time and place of someone else's choosing; a woman is irreparably damaged by her psychologically and physically abusive husband. A disabled World War I veteran labors to make a life for himself and a place for his sister's family.

And through it all, an impossible love clings to hope.

be forwarned, there are no werewolves in this story, nor even one glittery vampire, heh
though, there is a very brief incident (a story within the story, you could say) involving a trio of wolves, a hunter and a deer, but that's beside the point.

I have no idea whether this is based on actual events or not.

I don't know whether the characters ever existed.

I don't know whether Wolf River and the village of Millfield, Manitoba actually exist (OK, I do admit that Manitoba DOES exist)

I don't know whether the meteorological events described in this book even really happened.

I do know that I would like to think that they did.

As such, this book takes you on a little history and geographic tour of a small village and its evolution from 1915 to 1987, as well as the story of some, if not most, even maybe all, of its settlers and their descendants. A lot of the chapters are simply letters written from what starts out as the main character (view spoiler) to his sister.

It does have some clichés, somebody dies in the present, and their "children" going thru their stuff, find out some of the family secrets. An "impossible" love-story. And I did find that the beginning was a little too much charged with unnecessary descriptions. But, the story soon finds its stride and becomes very captivating. A few bits were left open, (view spoiler)

There is a large cast of characters which does sometimes make it a little difficult to follow, and so many deaths, but then again, one would expect to have a lot of deaths in the living conditions of the place and era. Also, if you need to put the story aside, say for sleep, or to go to work, getting back into it might prove a little difficult if you have a rotten memory (like moi), therefore, I would strongly suggest that you put aside the appropriate time to read the book in a single sitting, if at all possible.

Still, all in all, a very nice Canadian Prairies story.

Some characters you love, some you hate.

Some weather you love, some you hate.

And you sort of have a love-hate relationship with the village of Millfield, Manitoba and Wolf River.

It's not often a book holds my attention the way Wolf River did! The storyline hooked me right from the beginning, and although I usually read books a chapter at a time I found myself devouring several chapters at a sitting.

Three things: First of all, the plot and several intertwined subplots are just complicated enough to keep you on your toes, yet not so much that you lose track of what is going on. Secondly, there are characters in here that you can justifiably hate, or that your heart can break for. And thirdly, the author manages to weave a lot
