I'm giving this 2.5 stars. As an LDS reader, I'm really excited when for once, I get to read a book that so heavily is centered around characters of my particular Christian denomination. This is no slight entry into the faith either, but with lots of terminology that probably only LDS readers would connect with. However, as I progressed through this story I found myself almost hoping no non-LDS readers picked this up. There is at times some inaccurate doctrinal statements. They are phrases that many in the church will quote in a talk or lesson, passed on by word of mouth as being accurate, yet they are not. Ok, I can overlook that because so many people do it. What frustrated me the most about this plot that oozes so much awesome potential is the heavy judgement loaded down on both Noelle & Pierce at times it's downright embarrassing. Her recently returned missionary sister has had an affair with her long time boyfriend and now they are engaged.. everyone else sees that as totally fine, but heaps guilt trips and judgement on Noelle for struggling with it. Not only would that kind of behavior be considered hugely immoral if they had been married, but it's just unkind. You could argue if someone isn't married, everyone is fair game. Well I just think it's weird to expect two sisters to be OK and normal to just pass over a serious long term boyfriend she fully expects to marry to her other sister. The implications are huge. The hurt and betrayal are massive. Yet her so called loving and active LDS parents are calling Noelle out for the lack of forgiving behavior. Not on Melody for the double standard. It drove me crazy! Second, since when do we decide that because Pierce's parents are divorced that equals he will be bad husband material? This is such old archaic logic, and so incredibly wrong. Even if Pierce had previously been married, this does not automatically make him bad husband material. I have another book by this author sitting by my bed and I won't be reading it. The gossip that spreads around the Institute? The assumption that you must have sinned in the worst way if you go with a guy to his parents house in another state, yet, go to visit your own parents and label it 'introducing a girlfriend or boyfriend to the parents' suddenly makes it acceptable and not a sin. It would be really hard to get over it, especially when the second one came as such a surprise. After almost a year of dating, Chase broke up with Noelle when he announced that he was engaged to her sister and roommate, Melody. Noelle is heartbroken and Pierce, a longtime friend, takes it upon himself to help her get over it. Pierce has issues of his own to deal with and finds that Melody is just the person to help him heal.

I enjoyed the premise of the story, but I had a hard time connecting to the characters. They weren't consistent and acted completely opposite of themselves at times, which made it hard to really get a feel for who the character really was. I understand that people have conflicting feelings, but I felt that a smoother transition into those feelings would have been easier to understand. I hated that Noelle was the last one to know about her impending break-up, yet everyone expected her to be happy about it. Even her loved ones were very

supportive and concerned one minute, and then almost mean the next. Noelle was so worried about her reputation being ruined because she was hanging out with Pierce. He was a really great guy who dated around a lot, but I couldn't see how that would ruin her reputation. Pierce had family issues that were hard for him to deal with, but they seemed to be really blown out of proportion. There were moments that really drew me into the story, but there were other points where it felt like a travel log. I wanted to see the story and relationships unfold and not just hear about them briefly.

That said, I really liked watching Noelle mature. She's had some time away at college to do so, but it was her experiences that really helped her grow. I also loved seeing a friendship blossom into something more. There was an attraction there that sparked into more when the timing was right--it's all about the timing! Clean Romance

I'm lucky to have been reading a lot of really good, clean romance books lately. Some of my favorite authors have new books out and I love reading. This author is a new one on the LDS book scene. At least, she is new to me. This is the first book I've read by her.

Because I have been reading so many awesome books lately, I think it may have hurt my review of this book. It's really hard not to compare. This book wasn't nearly as good as so many I've been reading. It was okay, I just didn't love it. It was really slow moving and I felt like it went on and on. There was a lot of family drama for both main characters. The bones of the story are there and the plot has potential but I just didn't connect with the characters and I didn't feel compelled in any way. For me, this book was just okay.

This is an LDS fiction book. It is rooted in religious themes specific to the LDS faith.

I have mixed feelings about this book. On the one hand, it has an great storyline and the setting is described wonderfully-- I have lived in Flagstaff and it made me miss it. I like how the predicament is portrayed and how the reader can connect to the main character's heartache. However, when it came to capturing and

keeping interest, it fell a little short.

An excerpt from one of my instructor's lessons about fictional writing that I feel applies states, "Many writers think that successful fiction writing is full of detailed background information and character description. But paragraph after paragraph of character description or recounting of past events gets boring in a hurry. Readers want action, and a skilled writer will show, not tell. In other words, authors should try to weave exposition and narrative summary into real-time action, writing scenes that incorporate description with events."

I felt like that's what it was lacking-- action and descriptive details woven in to move the story forward. There were facts and details about minor characters that could have been left out. But more details about Noelle and Pierce as individuals would have made me feel more connected to them. I would love to have felt butterflies when they first touched. I would've loved for Noelle to be sleepless after their first kiss. Instead, it was more of a matter-of-fact event. Pierce was described as a gentleman but HOW was he gentleman? More descriptive writing rather than being told would have greatly enhanced the story.

One thing Laura Walker did well that many other authors mess up on is resurfacing facts and getting them straight. For example, as the reader, I never forgot that Noelle was a runner (which told me that she was also athletic and adventurous). Towards the end of the story, that was addressed again. Additionally, there was a lot of information given about each character's families. And although much of that could have been excluded, the information given was kept in line as if the characters were real people.

Considering that this is the first published book from the author, it really was a great book overall. It's a clean read that I wouldn't mind my daughters reading. I truly look forward to what else comes from Laura Walker. She is certainly a talented author who will only get better with time.
