Cherry Lane by Rochelle Alers is the last book in the Cavanaugh Island series. It follows two lawyers; Devin Gilmore who we met in Magnolia Drive and David Sullivan, Jeff's cousin who we know from Angel's Landing.

Devin is Keaton's business manager and lawyer and decided to visit Cavanaugh Island for a little rest and relaxation after the betrayal of her ex boyfriend and the discovery that she is pregnant. Enter David Sullivan. They meet on the night of her arrival at a get together. A week later they are in love and engaged to be married.

I am used to the trademark Rochelle Alers style and am quite aware that the vast majority of her characters fall in love and get married really quickly. I'm typically fine with it but for this story, however, it didn't really work for me. I just found it hard to believe that David was so willing to become a father to Devon's unborn baby so quickly. He knew absolutely nothing about the real circumstances surrounding her pregnancy and failed relationship until well after the fact.

Don't get me wrong, I know there are good men out there and more than a few that would willingly step up to the plate if they felt called to but this one was a bit much. He didn't even have time to process the fact that the woman he was interested in was pregnant. He went from thinking she was beautiful to offering her a position at his new law practice and then proposing and becoming her protector in record time. There was no hesitancy on his end or anything. While I am willing to suspend my disbelief a lot when reading fiction, I couldn't really do that in this situation. I wanted him to at least contemplate whether he was sure about his decision. I wanted him to ask more questions, I wanted there to be at least a little chink in his armor. There is such a thing as too perfect and David Sullivan was it. I didn't really believe his character and how he reacted to this new situation and that is an absolute first for me in any Rochelle Alers book.

Devon was a bit more tolerable on my end but even she too irritated me quite a few times. In the end I guess this is why they were perfect for each other.

Aside from that, the book did have its redeeming qualities. We got a peek into everyone's lives and received updates on all of the couples from the previous books. That for me was worth it and why I would still say it was an okay read. Fans of Rochelle Alers would be happy with this book. Per her usual, we got rich history, beautiful backdrops and the sort of love between the characters that we have come to expect.

Cherry Lane was probably the weakest of the Cavanaugh Island books in my opinion. However, if you have read the other books in this series I would recommend reading it to properly tie up the series and the characters we have become acquainted with.

Devon Gilmore has returned to Cavanaugh Island for a birthday party for her good friend's fiancé. She loves the island and the sense of family and friendship she feels whenever she is there. She feels that she is closer to some on the island than she is with her friends in New York City. And when she meets David Sullivan at the party, she feels an instant attraction. She would like to get to know him better, but there are a couple of problems with that idea. First, she is only visiting and does not want to start a long distance relationship. And second, and an even bigger problem, is that she is pregnant. After breaking up with her boyfriend and finding

out that he has been cheating on her and actually has a fiancé, she learns that she is pregnant. She tries to let the father of the baby know, but he does not return any of her correspondence. She decides that she will keep the baby and raise the baby as a single parent. She does not want to get involved with anyone while carrying another man's child. Talk about bad timing.

When David meets Devon, he too feels an instant attraction. After spending just a short amount time with her, he knows that he wants to keep her in his life. He has never met anyone like her and he cannot imagine his life without her in it. When he finds out that she is pregnant, it only takes him a small amount of time to accept the child and decide he wants to raise it as his own. He just needs to convince Devon that they are meant to be together and that she will grow to love him.

The writing style flows smoothly and the book is an easy read. The writer is very descriptive and she made the book come alive for me. Whether I was reading about the island or the food or the Gullah culture, I felt like I was right there, experiencing these things first hand. There are many scenes where the food they are cooking and eating are described in tantalizing detail and my mouth was almost watering. The author must be a gourmet cook because you could tell that she has a lot of knowledge of fine cuisine.

The characters are well rounded and well developed. I like both Devon and David and feel like they are people I would like to be friends with. I enjoyed reading about their relationship but I felt like the relationship developed way too fast. Within just a couple of weeks they were engaged to be married and making their wedding plans. They were married within a month of meeting each other. This was just too fast to be realistic, at least for me. I would have liked it much more if the relationship had evolved over the course of months, not weeks.

I enjoyed reading about the other characters that I met when I read Magnolia Drive. It was great to catch up with them and see how their lives were going. I liked that Francine was back to add a touch of paranormal to the book.

There is suspense and mystery in the book because of Devon's ex-boyfriend. When it was introduced in the story, it was a surprise to me and I enjoyed that. It is a great twist in the book but I just wished that it would have been developed a little more than it was. I do not want to give anything away but I wish that more time would have spent with the suspense aspect because it added an extra layer to the story.

I would recommend this book to anyone who enjoys a well-developed romance. The author is a very good writer and she pens a great story that is descriptive and detailed. This is the second book I have read in the series and I have enjoyed them both.

The naivety of Devon is one of her character flaws that was shown repeated, first by not knowing Emerson, her baby's biological father and Washington D.C. politician, was engaged to be married after dating him for one year.... And she was slated to be a strong-willed, smart, and rich lawyer. Next she gave into David's wishes, even though she independent and was planning to be a single mother.

David, on the other hand, pretended to very altruistic, as he unconditionally accepts and falls in love with Devon and her unborn child. Yet, he arranged and manipulated Devon into staying at the Cove, then his

house, and she just thinks it's sheer luck, even though he told her his law firm had several suites in reserve. They both promised to be honest and open with each other, yet their actions were contrary to this.
