This was a cute book, though I have to say, the kid Zeb was a MONSTER. He really needed better discipline and maybe medication. He was TOO much.

If I was Hissy, I would have been a hissing, unhappy cat myself. If I wasn't able to get the sleep I needed, I would be hissing and scratching too.

I think this is a good book for much younger readers to get to see how cats need rest and respect and that if they don't get the rest they need, they can be unhappy. I liked how Zeb had a much calmer twin Abe, to show a better way to be around cats.

Though I do think it is a bit easier for cats to fall asleep with noise than Hissy found, it was cute.

The one thing I didn't like was the outdoor cat thing. Cats need to be indoors to keep them safe. When I was younger, we had outdoor cats, but that was because they were strays that we took in and they were used to roaming. After one died from poison, we think that she had licked up anti-freeze, we brought them all in. I still regret to this day that they were outdoor cats. She wouldn't have died then. We were new cat "owners" then and didn't know any better. So I'm not happy with Hissy and all of his friends being outdoor cats. The "cage match" with the raccoon was really scary to me. Hissy's ear was torn. If he was bitten and the raccoon had rabies...very different end to the story.

Also, Hissy ACTED like he had rabies when he was prowling down the middle of the sidewalk and attacking anything that moved. I know as an adult, I wouldn't have stood for it and I would have been going to Hissy's owners with some demands that Hissy be kept indoors to keep others safe.

But they were both lousy parents and lousy pet owners, so I doubt anything good would come from locking Hissy in with that monster of a child. (shudder)

The entire story revolves around an afternoon and night in the life of a sleep deprived cat. Hissy spends every word of the story looking for a safe, quiet place to nap, but his human family is too noisy. Once night falls, his hunting instinct switches on, making it impossible to sleep. At one point, the sleep deprivation becomes too much for Hissy—who is a grump to begin with—and he goes on a rampage.

Yes, this is me, owner of four cats, the one that people send cat videos to and birthday cards with cats on them, giving a book about a cat a bad rating. The book is Hissy Fitz by Patrick Jennings. Sorry, Hissy Fitz, I'm just not a fan. You're just too much of a nasty cat. Hissy lives with a family of five - Mom, Dad, 8-year old Georgie who dotes over Hissy (even when Hissy is not so nice to her), and twin boys, Zeb and Abe. Hissy's problem is that he is sleep deprived. Living in a house with 5 humans can be awfully noisy, and with all this noise, Hissy can't sleep. Now Hissy, yes, I can understand your need to run away from Zeb, the hyperactive 3 year old who would probably do you bodily harm if he ever catches you, but really, did you have to be so nasty to Georgie just because she wants to talk. Most cats love to cuddle with their owners and listen to their ramblings, purring contently as their fur is stroked. Why you even resent sweet, quiet Abe, who softly wishes you a "good night and sweet dreams" from his bunny puppet, Medium Sad Guy, and then himself? Did I really just give a children's book a 1 Star rating. Yep. Am I sorry?

The blurb told me *Hissy Fitz* would be a "humorous tale about a cat that makes Grumpy Cat seem cheerful." It was not. I decided to pick up some ARCs of children's books because I'm always on the hunt for stories that I can recommend/purchase for friends or ones that my youngest child might enjoy. Sadly, I found the tale of one day of Hissy Fitz's life to be dull and I have a hard time imagining what kind of magical child would be able to finish this book without complaints of boredom.

Hissy Fitz just wants to get some sleep, but instead he spends his day avoiding the excessive snuggling of his young female owner and being tormented by her younger brother. Not only do these humans not know when to leave a guy alone, but they aren't aware of the rules when it comes to petting, food and water distribution, and appropriate noise levels either. Based on the synopsis, I had my hopes set on something much more similar to the hilarious *Sad Cat Diary* and this story just didn't deliver.

I also had a bit of a problem with the 100% **undisciplined** hellion brother ("time outs aren't allowed" - seriously parents? and you wonder why your kid is a butthole!) and the fact that Hissy Fitz was an indoor/outdoor cat who lived in a city with acknowledged dangers such as busy streets, traffic, and enemies such as the evil raccoon. I'll refrain from getting on a soapbox regarding the whole indoor/outdoor cat debate further. There could have been a small chance for redemption if the artwork would have been good, but sadly the artwork was not provided. Note to authors/publishers: It's hard to review an ARC that isn't complete.

I gave this delightful story about a cranky, disgruntled cat five stars. It's about a family cat turned into a

raging tiger by lack of sleep. I selected this book because I grew up in the South where a 'hissy fit' was something to behold. I smiled when it turned out that Hissy was the sleep-deprived cat that lived with the Fitz family.

This story describes a day where he seeks, without success, a place to sleep uninterrupted. He has a grand adventure that culminates with a cat soccer team before going home & going to bed.

After Hissy battles a racoon in a garbage dumpster & gaining the best of the animal, Hissy reports: "While it waits, it can think about the mistakes it's made, including the damage it did to the ear of Hissy Fitz, Panther of the Night."

It's written for ages twelve & up. I think it would be equally as entertaining with younger children, although some young ones might be frightened by a puffed-up frustrated feline that spits & scratches. Interestingly enough, I liked the illustrations in the advanced reading copy better than the finished drawings.

Poor Hissy Fitz (the cat). He is a fine and lovable cat, with refined tastes, which means he hisses frequently if his demands, which are many, are not met. He tries to live a relaxed, serene cat life with the Fitz family, only to have his rest continually disrupted by noise, pouncing children, and the usual catastrophes felines have to endure. He has severe insomnia from this constant barrage of misfortune, and the more he cannot sleep, the grouchier and hissier he becomes. Luckily Hissy has a good group of cat buddies who introduce him to soccer, and he finally gets worn out enough to get his well-deserved rest.

I am owned by many cats and I thought this book was not only hysterical, but an accurate portrayal of how difficult a cat's life can be (from a cat point of view). Written in the first person by Hissy himself, I laughed out loud as he described the challenges of getting food (wet, not dry, and even better if it is human food fetched from a Dumpster), petting preferences (cheeks, not tail), fending off dogs, and the eternal quest to find a good place to sleep. Since my cats sleep anywhere and anytime, in a quiet, solo adult household, I really felt for poor Hissy as he tried to find comfort in his chaotic world.

While this is a book for children, I enjoyed it immensely and think it is a book for children and cat lovers of all ages. Dog people would enjoy it, too, as it provides grist for the "dogs are better than cats" mill.

Hissy Fitz, the cat owned by eight-year-old Georgie, is truly a nasty feline. Whenever he doesn't get his way he hisses and scratches. His impatience is understandable when the reader considers his habitat, a home with three young lively children. Georgie loves her cat Hissy, sometimes giving him no privacy for his much needed naps during the day, a necessity for his nocturnal lifestyle. His worst challenge is loud Zeb, the three-year-old aggressive twin who loves to chase and grab Hissy, playing with him roughly. His favorite family member is Abe the quiet intuitive twin who is gentle and protective.
