The wording of the retelling highlights opposites (happy/sad, on/off, in/out, etc). It's a fine book for early readers or for Frozen admirers.

While I do obviously understand that this was written for very young children who are just beginning to read (I picked it up because I absolutely love *Frozen*), it would be difficult even for a very young child to follow the plot of this book; you would definitely need to have seen the movie. It isn't that the reading level would be too difficult for a very young child to read (it's definitely written at an appropriate reading level for very

young children), but far too much is left out of the plot. Tish Rabe (the writer), for example, reveals that Elsa runs away and creates an ice palace, but she does not explain why. If I were a young child reading this book without having seen the movie, the book might help me enhance my reading skills, but the plot would be utterly nonsensical.
