HOHENSTEIN by Didi Lawson, filled the bill for me. This book takes me to a modern (? Not sure what year it's actually set in, though there are cars but also dresses) fairytale in which the edges are a little frayed and the gilt a bit tarnished. It is a clean, sweet romance with some gumption. No swearing or sex or excessive partying (although there is a German wedding...probably with an oompah band).

It's still a fairytale in an uncommon setting. We hear all the time about the English aristocracy, but rarely their German brothers and sisters. I found it refreshing to traipse around the German countryside in a horse-drawn coach, and to tour the unvisited corners of the castle that tourists don't get to see into.

This is a book about Marie-Louise, a baroness who has fallen on hard times and must scrape up the money to refurbish her castle. We always think of the romantic side of castles, while never really remembering that they are drafty and damp and sometimes moldy and decrepit.

Sometimes the love story can be just as drafty and damp. She falls for the wrong man, not the commoner she vowed to marry, and who wants to marry her. Not only that, but her knight in shining armor won't ride to her rescue. Marie-Louise has to rescue herself all the time. Well nearly all. She can't quite understand how the guy she's sweet on can kiss her one minute and stuffily refuse her aid in the next.

HOHENSTEIN captured the tattered magic for me as surely as my mother's myriad fairy stories. The plot is interesting, the setting outstanding, the characters honest and lovable. I would have liked a little more action in the first parts of the book to get into it faster, but it levelled out in the end.

Marie-Louise had to learn to work hard to preserve her heritage, not have it handed to her on a sterling silver platter. Along the way, she found she could do difficult things. She discovered a resourcefulness and a willingness to look beyond how much money a person made or didn't make, to the gentle kindness beneath.

My vote is a good four Schwarzwälder torte out of five. I'm looking forward to reading more by Didi Lawson in the future.
