I didn't enjoy The Seventh Ward as much as I did Shallow Graves - the first book in The Haunted Series.

I found the descriptions of some of the patients to be both confused and confusing - for instance, a reference to a four-year-old being switched to that of a seven-year-old on the next page by a different character and the conversation continuing with reference to a seven-year-old and no correction regarding the mention of the subject earlier being described as being 4.

Some parts felt rushed, with others being drawn out with longer than necessary descriptions; meanwhile, it seemed that some characters may have been heavily influenced by some in other works of fiction (aside from the acknowledged nod to Victor Frankenstein and his creation).

There was also, fairly early on, use of the incredibly grating "off of" - whilst this is fairly common parlance amongst Americans, it is incorrect english (with the "of" being redundant) and as it was being used in the

narrative rather than in speech it really should have been picked up by the editor, if not the writer himself.

I got through the book in a single evening although, I have to say, it was more to just be done with it than to find out what happened.

That said, I would by no means say this is a bad book; I just didn't feel that it lived up to the first in the series, which promised greater things for the three main characters in this book.

I'm undecided as to whether to continue with the series; as it's more an investment of time than money (the books are available as part of the Amazon Kindle Unlimited subscription, which is where I got my copy from), I will probably read at least one more since I can get through them in one day.
