Thank you Netgalley and Amazon Crossing for the eARC of this terrific book. A great story, set in Finland, a country we don't hear about that often, this was a real treat to read. Plus, the translation was a good one.

Maria Kallio, Commander of the Espoo Crime Unit, a married mother with two children who has to juggle her career with her private life, is leading the case of a murdered journalist, shot while she was swimming. Anukka, a well-known journalist, was in the process of publishing her book about Sasha Smeds, Finland's foremost rally driver, but is killed before the event.

Maria and her team are stymied: who could have known Anukka was going to swim at that time and at that place? And what was the motive?

Solving the case isn't Maria's only problem. Ursula Honkaning, the new VCU Detective, is difficult, to say the least, probably leaking to the press and even accusing one of the male detectives of sexual harassment. The background story of the area where the Smeds family lives is fascinating. Russia leased the area from Finland for years and the history was so interesting. What's better than an exciting mystery that informs, has atmosphere and delivers a cracking, surprising ending? I love the series and can't wait for the next book. I believe there are several more waiting to be translated...hurry, please!

The book was written in Finland quite a few years ago and only translated into English recently. The translator did a wonderful job and the story reads well. I was a little concerned before starting this novel that, as the eighth in a series, it might be either too formulaic for my tastes or that the storyline would necessitate my having read least a few of its predecessors. I need not have worried! Lehtolainen has created an interesting cast of characters, especially in her lead detective Maria Kallio, and given them a compelling case to solve. Being a Finnish novel, this book obviously falls within the Scandinavian crime genre, but I felt that it also had a certain refreshing otherness which I liked.

Below The Surface keeps a good pace, but is very much a realistic mystery rather than an action thriller. Kallio's case isn't all plain sailing. Neither solved by preternatural leaps of faith. The police work relies on a team of officers and this, together with Lehtolainen's frequent social commentary, was reminiscent for me of the excellent Martin Beck mysteries by Sjöwall and Wahlöö. I was pleasantly surprised by how much I enjoyed reading Below The Surface and would happily get more in this series.

Detective Lieutenant Maria Kallio and part of her team respond to a woman in a lake who has been shot. Believing that hunters must have accidentally killed her, they soon find out that she was shot with a small caliber gun instead of a large rifle. The woman's name is Annukka Hackman. She is a journalist and the wife of a publisher whose name is Atro Jaaskelainen. She was writing a book on Sasha Smeds who is Finland's greatest rally driver. Apparently, the book is controversial.

As the team's investigation gets underway, the confusion starts. Someone is leaking information to the press. It seems several men thought that they were going to marry Annukka. The pathologist is only one among others. And Smeds has his own secrets. Was the book going to be such a bombshell that some felt they needed to kill her? Is there a more personal reason? There are many, many suspects. And Annukka would do

anything to get a story – or so it is said. Between new babies and a hectic home life Maria and Koivu seem to have less and less time for the job. Rough going as it is, they knuckle down and get the job done.

Sasha Smeds is in a fiery crash. Was his car sabotaged? Or was it an accident? Someone has a copy of Annukka's manuscript on a disk. She reveals at least one secret in it. More people die. The name of Annukka's killer comes as a surprise, but not as surprising as the reason for committing the murder.

This is a well written and plotted novel. It starts out suspenseful and the suspense continues to build throughout the book. I liked the way that Maria's team got along – for the most part that is. There was sufficient background information given on the major characters to flesh them out, but not so much that it intruded in the story. It only added color and a sense of human-ness.

I want to thank NetGalley and AmazonCrossing for forwarding to me a copy of this good book to read and enjoy.

I find this installement to be an adequate continuation of the series but there was nothing new or innovative, in my opinion. The mystery seemed interesting, at first, but the way the plot unfolded left me with an indifferent impression. At times, I found it detrimental, predictable.

I think that this is a series that definitely garners points and attention due to its Finnish setting that appeals to those of us who enjoy bleak, wintry, atmospheric settings. However, in my humble opinion, the constant weaknesses of the series are repetition, blunt characters and average dialogue that is probably the result of a failed translation. Maria is interesting enough, unlike her husband and her co-workers and the focus on her family issues didn't really help "Below the Surface". I don't think I will continue with the series, although I can see that this installment will appeal to many people just like its predecessors.

Maria Kallio is an appealing detective and the mystery was tight with a good selection of suspects.
